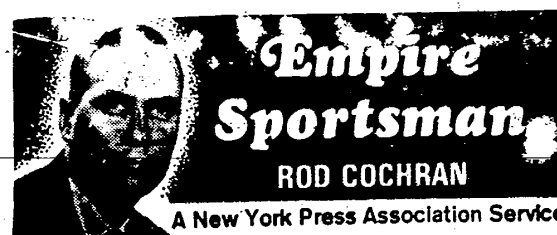

HUNTERS HELP DEER RESEARCH

The most unusual deer hunt in New York State occurred at the Huntington Wildlife Forest Station in Essex County, near Newcomb, in the Central Adirondack Mountains. Here deer hunters bopst their own sport by assisting with a deer research program.

The 15,000 - acre Station is a facility of the State University College of Forestry at Syracuse University, which is maintained to conduct forest wildlife research. Both game and fish species are studied, and for many years hunting was prohibited on the area. This led to an over-population of deer which had begun to harm the forest environment, according to Dr. Donald F. Behrend, director of research at Huntington.

"We censused the deer several years ago on two test plots, and computed that there was about one deer for every 23 acres in the tract studied," Behrend explained. "This was about twice the number we felt the habitat could support, and signs of overbrowsing were obvious."

The year of the first experimental deer hunt at Huntington was 1966, when 135 were taken. By cooperating with the Conservation Department's Fish and Wildlife Management Act, permits were issued and hunting was stopped when that year's quota was reached. A map of the area, and a fluorescent orange vest were also issued to each hunter.

Sixty deer were shot by hunters in 1967, and it was determined that the herd reduction phase of the study was completed. Further hunts were to be based on annual production. Thirty-nine

deer were killed last year, and it took just two days to take the 1969 quota of 25 deer.

One of the remarkable findings of the project has been the recovery of the forest vegetation. Prior to hunting, one plot was found to contain 170 trees per acre. After two years of deer removal, the same plot yielded 9,200 trees per acre — the difference being new seedlings that formerly had been eaten as soon as they sprouted.

A number of other studies are being gleaned from the hunters' kill. All the Huntington deer are weighed and measured, and their age is determined by examination of the teeth. The reproductive rate of the herd is also checked and the animals are examined for parasites. Some of the heart have been sent to a laboratory doing research on human heart diseases.

In talking about the long-range usefulness of the deer-vegetation study, Behrend stated that the Huntington Station is interested in all aspects of the forest. "We are concerned about timber production, recreation, and watershed management, as well as wildlife management," he explained. "Since most of the large natural predators of deer no longer live in New York State, hunting must take their place. Over-population of deer will ultimately lead to the destruction of the forest as we know it, and eventually to the destruction of the deer themselves."

Sharing this concern with the researchers, are the sportsmen from all over the state who have been helping with the project for the last four years.

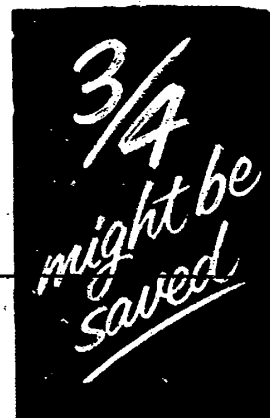
