Senator Urges **Pornography** Crackdown

A state-by-state crackdown on pornography that reaches child-ren through the mails has been urged by a New York Legislator State Senator William T. Conk-

lin' (R.-Brooklyn) proposed that members of legislatures through, out the nation join in promulgat-ing more stringent laws that will

Ing more stringent laws that will drive mail order pronographersout of business.

He made his plea through the annual meeting of the National Conference of State Legislative Leaders in Atlanta, Georgia, where he represented the New York State Legislature.

Senator Conklin said that state action can be farmore repressive in stamping out unsolicited pornography because federal statutes appear to be vacue and arbitrary.

"While there has been small

"While there has been small success to date in stopping the flow of filth mail with much of it getting into the hands of children I am sure state laws can head off smut syndication at the source" the Senator said.

He continued, "If each state, for example, would make it a fee

for example, would make it a fe-ony to publish and prepare mail-ings of pornographic material, the

merchants who thrive on this filth would soon go out of business.", "Every day thousands of children' are recipients of the rawest form of olscenity mailed to them

ren' are recipients of the rawest form of of scenity mailed to them from various parts of the country. Parents have pleaded with authorities to ston this flood of immoral enticement to impression able young children.

"Unless we crack down on the pornographers at the source if will never be stopped, and the only way to do this is to hand out long prison terms to the offenders. Anyman who cares little about corrupting children belones in jail."

The Senator pointed out that the effort to stop mailing of pornography had nothing to do with abridgement of freedom of expression. "Whatever adults choose to read is their own business." be commented "But I haven't found anyone who would condone the mailing of lascivious material to children as being part of the right of expression."
