Senator Urges Pornography Crackdown

A state-by-state crackdown on pornography that reaches children through the mails has been urged by a New York Legislator.

State Senator William T. Conklin (R-Brooklyn) proposed that members of legislatures throughout the nation join in promulgating more stringent laws that will drive mail order pornographers out of business.

He made his plea through the annual meeting of the National Conference of State Legislative Leaders in Atlanta, Georgia, where he represented the New York State Legislature.

Senator Conklin said that state action can be far more repressive in stamping out unsolicited pornography because federal statutes appear to be vague and arbitrary.

"While there has been small success to date in stopping the flow of filth mail with much of it getting into the hands of children, I am sure state laws can head off smut syndication at the source," the Senator said.

He continued, "If each state, for example, would make it a felony to publish and prepare mailings of pornographic material, the merchants who thrive on this filth would soon go out of business."

"Every day thousands of children are recipients of the rawest form of obscenity mailed to them from various parts of the country."

Parents have pleaded with authorities to stop this flood of immoral enticement to impressionable young children.

"Unless we crack down on the pornographers at the source, it will never be stopped, and the only way to do this is to hand out long prison terms to the offenders. Any man who cares little about corrupting children belongs in jail."

The Senator pointed out that the effort to stop mailing of pornography had nothing to do with abridgement of freedom of expression. "Whatever adults choose to read is their own business," he commented. "But I haven't found anyone who would condone the mailing of lascivious material to children, as being part of the right of expression."

Electronics Course Approved For County

An electronics mechanics training course has been approved by Allegany County and surrounding areas according to the Hornell and Wellsville Local Offices of the New York State Division of Employment and the Allegany County Board of Cooperative Educational Services.

Approval has been secured under the State Training Program to proceed with plans to train 15 electronics mechanics beginning February 2, 1970. The training will be given at the Allegany County Occupational Center, R. D. 2, Belmont, New York under the direction of the Allegany County Board of Cooperative Educational Services.

Recruiting for this training is in progress at the present time. Interested individuals should report at once to either the Wellsville Office of the New York State Division of Employment at 161 1/2 North Main Street or the Hornell Office at 20 Broadway.

The objective of the electronics mechanics course is to teach trainees to wire, modify and troubleshoot electronic industrial control systems using appropriate tools and equipment. Consideration will be given to applicants who are 18 years of age or over; have a minimum of two years of high school with algebra or an equivalent level of attainment; are interested in work of an electronic or electrical nature; are able to exercise a degree of independent judgment; are physically able to lift and climb; are willing to pursue a course of study for 36 weeks and are able to learn technical material in a classroom situation.

Weekly training allowances of \$50 per week will be paid to trainees who are heads of families or households. Weekly transportation, subsistence and dependency allowances also will be given to those who qualify.

This is an excellent opportunity for those who are interested in technical training. It will improve their employment prospects by acquiring skills in demand in the labor market.
