Hastings Reports On Food Stamp Program

Rep. James F. Hastings (38th Dist. N.Y.) has announced that Chautauqua, Steuben, Schuyler and Allegany Counties have been designated by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture for participation in the Food Stamp Program.

The program enables low-income families to boost their food purchasing power by buying food stamps which are worth more in grocery stores than the price paid for them.

The announcement was made from Rep. Hastings' Washington office and coincided with a statement by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin in which he said the program now covers 31 states, including 169 counties and 35 cities.

"The Food Stamp Program offers a double benefit for the people," Hastings said. "For those low-income families it affords an opportunity to buy enough food to give them a nutritional diet and for the county's food industry it gives them a chance to take part in an expanded market for food."

Rep. Hastings, who is sponsor of Legislation which would make elderly persons with limited income eligible for food stamps to change for hot meals, said the exact date when the four counties will start operations would be announced locally.

Prior to the announcement, the City of Jamestown, N. Y., and Cattaraugus County had been participants in the Food Stamp Program in the five-county 38th District.
