### "Why Can't All Babies Be Born Healthy Like Me?"

In the summer of 1921, when polio was widespread, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the only United States President to be re-elected three times, was stricken with the disease which crippled him for the rest of his life.

Poliomyelitis is known for its unfortunate capacity to give rise to crippling types of paralysis. It often appears in the form of summer epidemics. It is also known as infantile paralysis because it was once believed that the disease was limited to children only. However, it has since been proven that polio can strike any person at any age.

In 1955, Jonas Salk introduced a polio vaccine which has since been used as a preventive of polio. The Sabin oral vaccine is also used today. However, no cure for the disease has been found. Once a person becomes afflicted with the polio virus which enters the nose or mouth, the only thing he can do is rest and exercise.

Before the vaccine was discovered, poliomyelitis was a dread disease and President Roosevelt was afflicted with the disease in one of its most severe forms. To help people who might someday suffer the same pain which he had suffered, Roosevelt backed the March of Dimes campaign. Although the March of Dimes has shifted its emphasis from polio to birth defects, it still requires the support of voluntary donations.

The slogan of the 1970 March of Dimes campaign appears beside the picture of a healthy baby, whereas in previous years, the poster picture had showed a baby born with a birth defect. The slogan reads, "Why Can't All Babies Be Born Healthy Like Me?" Someday they might, but right now, here in America, over 1/4 million babies are born with birth defects each year.

The following appears with the slogan: "When you give to the March of Dimes you help prevent birth defects. You help support more than one hundred birth defect treatment centers. You help support brilliant medical, scientific investigators including those at the Salk Institute for Biological Studies. You help support a massive health education program aimed at getting the best possible medical care for every mother-to-be."

Some of her activities include being in Choir for two years and being in GAA for three years. She also helped with the make-up at the Senior Play.

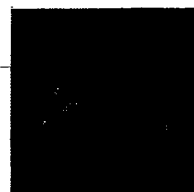
