

Truck Owners Invited To Air Pollution Meeting

Air pollution caused by diesel trucks and buses is the target of an accelerated enforcement program soon to be inaugurated by the State Health Department's Division of Air Resources.

Area owners of diesel bus and truck fleets have been invited to an informational meeting in Elmira, Monday, Feb. 11, co-sponsored by the N. Y. State and Chemung County health departments. Representatives of the State Health Department will discuss enforcement of state regulations regarding smoke emissions and idling of diesel-powered vehicles and will request the owners' cooperation in meeting the requirements.

Participants will include: James W. Better, Chief of the investigation and abatement section, Division of Air Resources, State Health Department; James E. Barry, director of environmental health services, Chemung County Health Department; and Stanley Gubner, regional air pollution control engineer, Rochester-regional office of the State Health Department.

More than 100 owners from Chemung, Allegany, Schuyler and Steuben counties have been asked to attend the meeting, which will begin at 1:30 p. m. in the Community Room, in the basement of the Chemung County Savings and Loan Bldg., 351 N. Main St. Owners or operators who have not received invitations are also welcome to attend.

A similar meeting was held in Rochester, Jan. 28 for owners in Monroe, Orleans, Wayne, Livingston, Ontario, Yates and Seneca counties.

Regulations Published On Open Burning

The State Air Pollution Control Board has published regulations on open burning, effective February 15, Dr. Hollis S. Ingraham, State Health Commissioner and Chairman of the Air Pollution Control Board, has announced.

The burning of garbage, rubbish-for-salvage, and refuse at dumps is prohibited. This prohibition includes refuse disposal areas serving towns, villages, and cities, and there are no exemptions.

On-site or 'backyard' burning of residential rubbish is prohibited in cities and villages, and in any town of over 20,000. Residents of towns of less than 20,000 population are allowed to burn rubbish unless prohibited by local ordinance or law, or by a rule of the State Department of Conservation.

The governing body of a county, city, village or town may petition the State Air Pollution Control Board to designate an area where trees, tree trimmings, leaves and brush can be burned. A municipality may also petition the Board to adopt a special ruling allowing on-site burning of such yard waste.

Honor Roll Of Supporters For Senior Citizen's Information Center


The Honor Roll of 37 area businesses, churches, organizations and individuals, giving or pledging a combined total of \$4,180 toward the three-year Local Support for Informational Center for Rural Senior Citizens was published in late November 1969.

By January 6, 46 new and three repeat donor churches, businesses, organizations and individuals had given an added \$4,630.

"The total Local Support for the Center's work at this point, amounts to \$8,790", said Robert G. Aldrich, Coordinator for this unique service Project for the rural elderly. "When the Project started on July 1, 1968, \$19,936 was required to match Federal State funding. Now, a balance of \$11,146 in Local Support is required to permit fulfillment of the Project's objectives by July 1, 1971", said Aldrich.

The contributions (large or small), to the Center from these most recent additions to the Honor Roll is indicative of those with real concern for serving the needs of our 5,230 aging neighbors.
