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Cindy Preston Wins Betty Crocker Award

Cindy Preston, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Merton Preston, has been named the 1970 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Andover Central School on the basis of her score in a written knowledge and aptitude test on homemaking given to senior girls here on December 2, 1969.

Cindy has been involved in many school activities such as the National Honor Society, Student Council, Band and Choir, Editor of Hi-Herald, Area All-State Chorus, Cheerleading and Red Cross. She is the recipient of a New York State Regents Scholarship and she is the Advertising Editor of the 1970 Yearbook.

Cindy hopes to pursue a course in Liberal Arts at one of the schools to which she has applied. Her interests center around the State University at Geneseo and Albany or possibly William Smith College.

In recognition of her ability, Cindy will represent Andover Central School in the State Contest and, hopefully, the National one. These will make her eligible for State and National Scholarships.

The state winner will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship, and her school will be awarded a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica by the Encyclopedia Britannica Inc. The runner-up will earn a \$500 educational grant.

The winner from New York State, together with the winners from all other states and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a school advisor, will go on an expense paid tour of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg next spring. Climax of the tour will be the announcement of the 1970 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. The decision will be made on the basis of her original test score and personal interview made during the trip. The winner's scholarship will be increased to \$5,000.

This is the 16th year of the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow, which started in 1954. A record 646,041 senior girls in 15,040 of the country's high schools were enrolled in this year's Search.

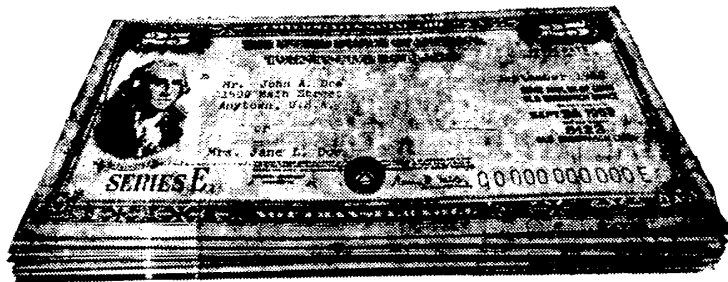
Who Are They?
