### Notice Of Adoption Of Village Ordinance For The Regulation Of Traffic

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover, held in the Village Office, Andover, N. Y., on Monday evening, February 9th, 1970, after a public hearing held as required by Law, of which due notice was published in the Andover News, the following Ordinance was adopted, regulating traffic upon the highways within the corporate limits of the Village of Andover, Allegany County, N. Y.

It is ordained and adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover as follows:

## ARTICLE VII

The following additions are made to Section 9, Parking Time Limited in Designated Locations:

(a) the parking of vehicles hereby prohibited in the following locations:

3. For a period of longer than 2 hours on the East and West side of Main Street from the Southerly intersection of Elm Street with Main Street to the Southerly intersection of Chestnut Street, also known as Route 17, with Main Street, except for places on both the East and West side of Main Street that are already designated to "No Standing" or "Limited Parking".

4. For a period of longer than 2 hours on the North and South sides of East Greenwood Street from the intersection of Church Street and East Greenwood Street to the intersection of East Greenwood Street and Main Street, except for places on both the North and South side of East Greenwood Street that are already designated as "No Standing".

Every person convicted of a violation of the provisions of Section 2, including the above addition to Section 9 of Article VII shall be punished by a fine of not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00), for each and every violation of the above Ordinance.
