## Emergency Medical Care Training Course To Be Held at Ag-Tech

A course in emergency medical care training is planned again this year at the State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred.

Offered through the college's Division for Continuing Education, the program is designed to train area persons connected with ambulance service. It will begin on March 12 and continue with evening sessions Thursday through May 14.

The course is limited to persons who hold a currently valid advanced Red Cross first aid certificate.

Registration will also be limited to 60 this year, according to Reed D. Lowrey, director of continuing education at the college. He said this is to allow greater opportunity for participation by everyone in a practice session which is part of this year's course.

The 10-week course consists of 36 hours of instruction, with participants meeting from 7 p. m., to 10 p. m., for 10 consecutive Thursday evenings. The other six hours will be enrolled for a Saturday, May 2, practice session in which those enrolled will receive training in practical application of what they have learned in the classroom regarding retrieval of accident victims and other emergency procedures.

Those successfully completing the course will receive certificates from the New York State Department of Health.

Dr. Roger Blaisdell, college physician, will serve as medical coordinator for the sessions, while the overall coordinator is Ronald Putnam, associate professor of the Medical Services Department at Alfred State College.

A fee of \$5 is being charged for registration and for two booklets, which each participant will receive. Registration forms and additional information is available by contacting Mr. Lowrey's office in the college administration building.

Mr. Lowrey said the college is sponsoring the course for the second straight year as a community service to help ambulance personnel to do a better job. Last year a total of 114 persons completed

## 4-H Snowmobile Safety Programs Being Initiated In New York

Ithaca, N. Y. — Snowmobile accidents are rising and will increase as the racy, winter fun machine continues to grow in numbers and gain popularity, a Cornell University safety specialist warns.

Concerned with possible dangers involved in snowmobiling, Cooperative Extension at the N. Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell University, is launching an experimental 4-H program to train youthful operators in many parts of the state.

In line with the experimental program, Prof. Edward O. Eaton, agricultural engineer at the College, is conducting a thorough evaluation of snowmobiles to develop a series of safety measures for snowmobile enthusiasts.

Meanwhile, the New York State Rural Safety Council is developing safety pointers on a statewide scale while strongly supporting the 4-H training program, according to Eaton, who serves the Council as executive secretary.

A crossbreed between a motor scooter and a pair of skis, the snowmobile has become a major winter fun machine across the country, while its uses for other practical purposes also are increasing.

"There are no hard statistics on the number of snowmobiles, but it is estimated that more than one million machines are in operation in the United States. The figure is estimated at more than 100,000 in New York State, and numbers may increase rapidly as the popularity of the machine soars.

Pointing to the lack of legislation governing snowmobile operations in the state, Eaton says, "The uses of the machine necessitate the need for safety rules and

regulations.

The experimental 4-H program, now being tested in 10 counties, focuses attention on safety, proper dress, engine care, respect for property and wildlife, and preventive maintenance. Counties involved are St. Lawrence, Jefferson, Lewis, Chautauqua, Fulton, Sullivan, Chenango, Franklin, Clinton and Essex.

The program involves young operators between the ages of nine and 19. Prof. Eaton, however, says that youthful operators under 12 years of age, unless accompanied by adults, may be too young to handle the machine alone in some emergency situations.

State police, sheriff's departments, conservation units, and snowmobile clubs are assisting with the 4-H program.

While backing the program, the N. Y. State Rural Safety Council has drafted these safety pointers for all operators to follow immediately until further safety rules are firmly established.

— Become thoroughly familiar with the machine — its starting procedure, adjustment, and preventive maintenance based on the owner's manual.

— Learn the various driving positions — sitting, kneeling, and standing and their best applications.

— Dress properly and become familiar with the "chill factor chart" that shows the temperature at different wind velocities in cold weather.

— Carry a safety kit and be prepared for simple troubleshooting on the power unit.

— Operate only on approved trails and on land where permission is given. Also, get acquainted with the terrain at slow speed and identify hazards.

— Always use lights when riding at dusk or at night.

"Ignorance is no excuse for violating the rules, and operators should check with local authorities on where they can drive their snowmobiles safely", Eaton notes.

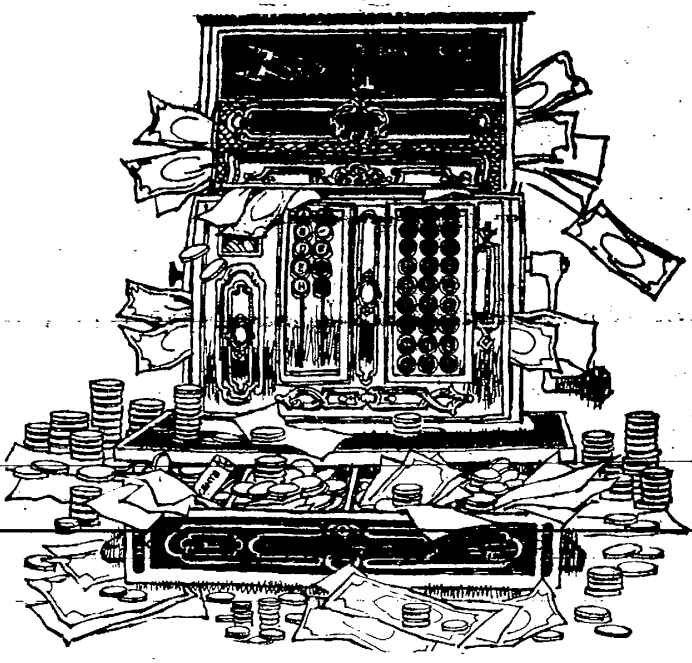
