Post Offices To Expand Rural Home Delivery

Washington, D. C.—Rep. James F. Hastings recently listed the 103 post offices in his five-county 38th District which will provide expanded rural home delivery service under a recently announced program by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount.

The expanded service now permits persons living near post offices to receive delivery of their mail at home. Before, it was necessary for them to go to the post office and pick up their mail. The post offices which are eligible to provide this expanded service, he said, are:

Allegany County: Alfred Station, Allentown, Almond, Andover, Angelica, Belfast, Canaseraga, Canadea, Ceres, Fillmore, Friendship, Houghton, Home, Little Genesee, Richburg, Scio, West Clarksville and Whitesville.

Previously, persons could not get city delivery because they lived near the post office.

Under the new program, persons living more than a quarter mile but less than a half mile from the post office are eligible for home delivery providing they request it of the postmaster and the majority living in the area desire it, Rep. Hastings said.

B. M. (Mack) Brundage of Hamlin, Texas, died Friday in the Hendrick Memorial Hospital at Abilene. He has been hospitalized about three weeks.

Mr. Brundage was born April 7, 1898, in Andover, N. Y. and a graduate of Andover High School.

As a teen-ager he went to work with the natural gas division of the Texas Co. and was sent in 1915 to Shreveport. He became a Texan in 1917 when the gas company sent him to Baird as local manager.

Mr. Brundage joined the West Texas Utilities organization in 1928. He was sent to Rotan as local WTU manager, a post he held two years. In 1930 he was transferred to Hamlin which remained his home. From 1945 he was assistant district manager of the WTU Stamford district as well as local manager at Hamlin. He retired from WTU in the spring of 1963.

Mr. Brundage 71, was retired manager of West Texas Utilities

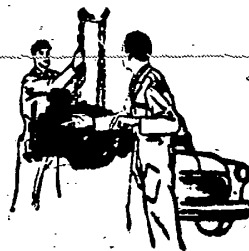
