

School Board Has Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday evening, March 9, by Mrs. Slade, President. Mr. Kessler and the following Board members were present: Lawrence Godown, Robert Tomm, Francis Horan and Connor Stephens.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these was made by Lawrence Godown and seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Mr. Kessler read the bills for the month of February 1970, amounting to \$10,680.30, plus utilities. Connor Stephens made the motion that these be paid. Francis Horan seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Cafeteria bills in the amount of \$1,265.80 were read by Mr. Kessler. Lawrence Godown made the motion that these be paid. Connor Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Bills to be paid on Title I — ESEA — 1969-70 were read by Mr. Kessler. The amount of these — \$264.65. A motion to pay these was made by Robert Tomm and seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's report was read for approval. Lawrence Godown made the motion that the report be accepted as read. Francis Horan seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria report was read by Mr. Kessler, showing a net loss of \$170.72 for the month of February. A motion was made by Mr. Horan to file this report with the minutes. Seconded by Connor Stephens. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The payrolls for the month were read for approval. Robert Tomm made the motion that the payrolls in the amount of \$41,128.19 be accepted. Mr. Godown seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Francis Horan made the motion that the President of the Board of Education, Mrs. Slade, be authorized to borrow \$55,000.00 in anticipation of revenue to be received from the State of New York. Robert Tomm seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Interest only is due on Bus No. 21 on April 14th — \$257.57. Interest only is due on Bus No. 23 on April 11th — \$42.90. Interest only is due on Bus No. 22 on April 15th — \$25.50. Robert Tomm made the motion that these obligations be paid. C. Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Board approved the transfer of the savings account to Two Year Savings Certificates at 5% interest. Lawrence Godown made the motion and Robert Tomm seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Francis Horan made the motion to accept the resignation of Mrs. Florence G. Diller — fourth grade teacher. C. Stephens seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Connor Stephens made the motion to accept the resignation of Miss Tonka Appolenaris — fifth grade teacher. L. Godown seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Robert Tomm made the motion to accept the resignation of Mrs. Clare Minarcik — first grade teacher. C. Stephens seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

F. Horan made the motion to approve the tenure appointment of Miss Mary Agnes Sullivan as Business Education teacher as of September 1, 1970. Seconded by L. Godown. Passed by 4 yes votes and 1 no vote.

Robert Tomm made the motion to accept the 1970 - 71 school schedule. L. Godown seconded. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Francis Horan made the motion that Mrs. Burger attend the English Conference at Syracuse. Seconded by R. Tomm. Passed by 5 yes votes.

L. Godown made the motion that Mr. Barden attend an Industrial Arts Conference at Oswego on May 17, 18th, 1970. Seconded by R. Tomm. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Mr. Kessler read a letter of appreciation from Mrs. Boyer and Mrs. Potter of our music department thanking us for the use of the school for the Ensemble and Solo Festival.

R. Tomm made a motion that Miss Harris attend a reading conference at Grossingers on April 8, 9, 10, 1970. Seconded by Connor Stephens. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Robert Tomm made a motion that a commercial company be contacted to design a policy book for Andover School District and a price for designing such a book be submitted. The motion was discussed but not seconded.

Robert Tomm made a motion that the Board of Education will sponsor at least one program a year on drugs for all employees. These programs will be to train personnel to detect and recognize symptoms of drug addicts. F. Horan seconded the motion. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Meeting adjourned by motion of Francis Horan at 10:45 P. M. Seconded by S. Stephens. Passed by 5 yes votes.

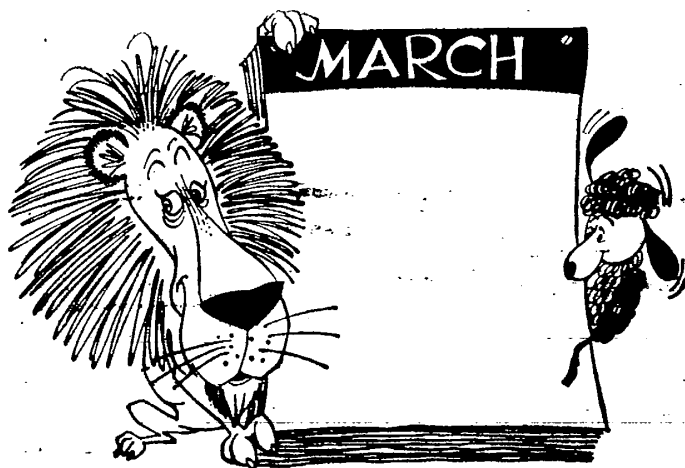
