There is scarcely a home that could be replaced for less than \$10,000, many are worth much more. Tons of milk are produced daily in this reservoir area. The mass destruction and wanton waste, that would take place — and all for recreation!

The Army Engineers told us this dam would be built primarily for recreation. Over \$5,000,000 according to Army Engineers figures just to move the railroad, which has wanted to quit for many years, a comparatively new military highway. Any one with a vote for this project should not complain when their tax bills start coming.

There seems to be several moral issues involved. It is hard to believe that any among the Clergy could favor Appalachia funds going for this purpose when there is real need for schools, hospitals, even food and clothing for so many Appalachia children.

#### Dog Obedience Training Program Again Offered

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A Dog Obedience training program for ANY boy or girl, who has a family dog, is being offered by the Allegany County 4-H Extension Service. The purpose of this dog project is to help boys and girs, particularly those who do not live on farms, learn to understand animals. It provides an educational tool to develop dependability and pride in ownership among youngsters.

Any boy or girl, 9 - 19 years of age, is eligible to participate ie this series of 10 classes to be held I hour weekly. Classes will be offered for Beginners and for Advanced training to those who have

vanced training to those who have been former participants in the

At the Beginner training classes the child will teach his dog on leash, how to walk on leash, sit on command, stay in place, come when called, heel on leash.

There is no charge for these classes but each member is expected to furnish leash and collar for his own dog.

Dog should be at least 9 months of age and in good health. Young dogs with a puppy's short atten-tion span are difficult to train. An older dog trains more readily, as he can still hear and see to

as he can respond.
