The Conference is one of eleven regional sessions being conducted by the New York State Division for Youth at the Call of Governor Rockefeller preliminary to a Statewide Governor's Conference on Children and Youth to be held sometime during September.

Both the Regional and Statewide Conferences are being conducted in preparation for the decennial White House Conference on Children and Youth scheduled for December 13 - 18 in Washington, D. C.

The purpose of the Regional Conference will be the formulation of recommendations on such problems as drugs, campus unrest, jobs, education, family relationships, and the issues facing young people today. These recommendations will be used as the basis for the discussions at the Statewide Conferences in September and a report to the Nation at the December White House Conference.

Wide Interest For Conservation Education

"Man has become a cancer, and is destroying his host, the earth." That's pretty strong language, but the public hearings being held by the Temporary State Commission on Youth Education in Conservation have turned up a groundswell of conservation and environmental concern. I attended the recent hearing at Binghamton, where a State University at Binghamton student included the above quote in his testimony.

The Commission has been getting an earful all across the state, and it seems like an urgent recommendation will be made to the Legislature to begin teaching conservation in New York's schools on a regular basis. Sportsmen have long begged for this approach, and now they are joined by housewives, businessmen, students, professors, and community leaders.

"A job which must be undertaken immediately is that of teacher education," said Christopher White, of the Finger Lakes Sierra Club. "It is not enough to require a course in teaching of conservation for certification. A multi-dimensional approach is needed emphasizing the economic, political and sociological aspects of conservation as well as the ecological."

"The whole world is in need of healing," state John G. New, State University College at Oneonta. "— the job of education we have

is immense. New values must be substituted for old, politicians must become more responsive to the needs of the people, we must find new ways to live together. Man must learn to love the earth, to treat it kindly, to cherish its resources."

Senator Bernard C. Smith, Northport, N. Y., Commission Chairman announced, "I believe that our basic responsibility is to develop a top grade conservation education program for the young people of our state; and in doing this, we will be exploring many fields, including:

A formal program of conservation education in our public schools from the earliest grades up through our high schools, thus eliminating the hit or miss system under which we have been laboring for so many years.

Developing outside our schools, Nature Education Centers.

Conservation Camps — to meet the demands being placed on our already crowded facilities.

Conservation Workshops — formal training programs for those who would teach environmental management to our youngsters."
