### Penn York College Night Scheduled For April 7

Ninety-nine colleges, junior colleges and business schools are sending admissions representatives to the first Penn-York College Night, sponsored by guidance counselors from McKean, Cattaraugus, Potter and Allegany Counties.

Scheduled for 7:30 p.m., April 7, at St. Bonaventure University, the event will bring high school juniors from thirty-six of the public and private schools in the four-county area, together with many parents, for interviews at the inner learning—institutions as varied as Penn State or Syracuse University on the one hand, and Olean Business Institute or the new Extension of Alfred Ag-Tech at Franklinville on the other.

Plans for the College Night have been under way for over a year, according to a spokesman for the guidance counselors. Many schools in the area have so few students that college representatives don't find a visit worthwhile. At the same time, a lot of students need a chance to acquaint themselves with the wide range of opportunities for higher education.

Counselors can advise and recommend, but only the students and their parents can make decisions as to which schools to apply. Moreover, each institution has its individual program, admissions routine and scholarship availability. And in a sense each has a unique personality. But it isn't possible for parents and students to visit all these places.

Therefore, the College Night idea has become a growing phenomenon all over the country.

Although intended primarily for students who will graduate in 1971, and thus will need to be applying next fall to several colleges or schools of their choice, the Penn-York conference is open to any person who needs information on college admissions. Some high school seniors may find a few schools with openings still available.
