Estimated Tax Due April 15

If your total estimated income and self-employment tax for 1970 exceeds your income tax withholding by \$40 or more, you should file a declaration of estimated tax. John E. Foley, District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Buffalo.

Complete instructions on how to file can be found on Form 1040-ES, which was sent to everyone who filed a declaration last year and others who according to IRS records probably are required to make a declaration.

Mr. Foley said vouchers and pre-addressed envelopes were included in the package for the taxpayers' convenience.

Estimates for 1970 are due by April 15, the same date that 1969 Federal income tax returns are due.

Mr. Foley said now is the time to start working on your income tax return. This will help you avoid the last minute rush if you run into something you are not sure about and need more information.

Taxpayers who fill out their tax returns early avoid the risk of making costly errors because of haste and carelessness. Mr. Foley said returns filed in April are more likely to result in errors than those filed earlier.

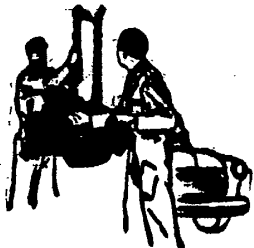
