## Steuben Area Council Boy Scout News

The Camping and the Health & Safety Committees of the Steuben Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, are conducting their annual pre-camp inspection of Camp Gorton on Monday afternoon, April 13, 1970.

The health and sanitary facilities of the camp layout are to be checked completely in contemplation of the busy summer camping program of the Council which starts July 5th for a seven week camping season.

Camping Chairman Donald E. Lugg of Knoxville, Pa., is to preside at the report meeting, which follows a field inspection of the camping facilities by teams of men. The tour of inspection starts at 4 P. M., followed by a camp dinner served at 6:30 P. M. in the Palen Dining Hall by Mrs. William L. Howland, the wife of Camp Gorton's ranger.

Charles R. Lord of Bath is to become a commissioned District Executive of the Steuben Area Council on April 15th, it has been announced by Scout Executive Claude H. Haley.

Mr. Lord is attending the 1970 15th session of the National Executive's Institute at Schiff Scout Reservation, Mendham, New Jersey, a training program which is required for all new men entering the professional Scouting career. The Institute is of 30 days duration, conducted by members of the National Staff of the Boy Scouts of America.

Mr. Lord joined the local staff of the Steuben Area Council on January 1, 1970 as an Executive Trainee. He is to cover the Scouting operation of Cubbing, Scouting, and Exploring in the Red Jacket District.

Previous to entering Scouting, Mr. Lord served as the administrative staff of the Otisville School for Boys as Recreation Therapist for 13 years.

## Beef Is Down

Over 62,000 beef calves are born in New York State each year but less than 5% of these are marketed on a weight-grade basis through organized sales. Beef may be up at the meat counter but on the farm many producers are apparently quite willing to take "the pickings" when marketing feeder calves.

This spring the directors of the Pike Feeder Calf Sale will conduct another cost basis sale of feeder calves on Saturday May 2. About 300 calves are expected from surrounding counties. Details on entries are available through directors of the New York Beef Cattle men's Association in each county Cooperative Extension Service of fees or sale officials.

County directors in the area are: Harold Land of Mayville (Chautauque); James Cash Jr., of Franklinville (Cattaraugus); Leonard Watson of Belmont (Allegany); Henry Cross Jr. of Bliss (Wyoming); and William Brown of East Concord (Erie). The sale manager is Victor Czerwinski of East Concord. The sale will be held at a local and national basis by volunteer Exploring leaders. The winners will be flown to Cape Kennedy for the intensive week-long 14-hour daily seminars dealing with every phase of the space program. "The Foundation's purpose," explained Mr. O'Brien, "is to accent the positive; to pat the good boy on the back and let him know there is a reward for being a responsible member of the community. We do this by seeking out young men in their formative years and providing opportunities, through yearly seminars in a variety of fields, for their leadership abilities to emerge and develop and to motivate others when they return home."

## Census Takers Easy To Identify

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying enumerators for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing. District Manager Russell A. Fuscus pointed out today. Enumerators, or census takers (most of whom are women), started making their rounds in the Area April 1 and are expected to complete their work in three to five weeks.

Each census taker will wear a red, white, and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. It bears the census taker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep confidential all census information you provide.

Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local police or to the census district office, which is located at 111 West Second St. Jamestown, N. Y. 14701.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is blue and bears the legend, "1970 Census." In the portfolio, the census taker carries her supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools necessary for her work.

The Space Seminar is being sponsored by Pepsi-Cola Company, and the Hugh O'Brien Youth Foundation in cooperation with the Exploring Division of the Boy Scouts of America and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration at the John F. Kennedy Space Center. Explorers are members of the high school action program at the BSA.
