### Put Social Security Number On Tax Payment To IRS

Some Buffalo District taxpayers make payments that cannot be properly credited to their account, eccording to John E. Foley, District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Buffalo. This happens when a payment is received without an accompanying form or notice or becomes separated from

out an accompanying form of not-tice or becomes separated from identifying documents. Payments that IRS can't identify re put in a special account until proper identification can be made, Mr. Foley said. This necessarily

Mr. Foley said. This necessarily celays action on that account.

To avoid such identification problems, Mr. Foley asked tax-payers to put their Social Security payers to put their Social Security number on their check or money order. It will also be helpful to hote the type of tax and period covered by the payment.

Mr. Foley said money order stubs or cancelled checks should be kept in case you are requested to verify a payment.

# Census Takers Easy To !dentify

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying enumerators for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing. District Manager and Housing, District Manager Russell A. Fuscus pointed out to-day. Enumerajors, or census tak-ers (most of whom are women), started making their rounds in the

ers (most of whom are women), started making their rounds in the Area April 1 and are expected to complete their work in three to five weeks.

Each census taker will wear a red, white, and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. It bears the census taker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep confidential all census information you provide.

Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local police or to the census district office, which is located at 111 West Second St. Jamestown, N. Y. 14701.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is blue and bears the leavend. "1970 Census." In the portfolio, the census taker carries her supplie, of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools necessary for her work.
