## Tax Refunds Are Delayed When Taxpayers Forget To Sign

A total of 2,861 Buffalo District taxpayers waiting for refund checks are instead getting their Federai income tax returns back because they failed to sign them.

An income tax return is a legal document and to be valid must be signed before the Internal Revenue Service can process it and

enue Service can process it and issue a refund, John E. Foley, District Director, Internal Revenue, Buffalo, said today. Signatures of both husband and wife are re-

of both husband and wife are required on joint returns, he added.

To help reduce the number of missing signatures. IRS has sent some 65 million taxpayers blank tax forms that highlight the signature lines in red ink.

Incorrect or missing Social Security numbers are also holding up tax refunds.

So far this year 3.650 refunds

curity numbers are also holding up tax refunds.

So far this year 3,650 refunds of Buffalo District taxpayers have been delayed because of a Social Security number error.

Use of the preaddressed name label, which includes the Social Security number, will insure proper identification and speed up processing, he noted.

Other taxpayer errors or failures to follow instructions that accompany tax returns and schedules are also holding up refunds. So far mistakes in arithmetic have caused delay in sending 16,769 refunds to Buffalo District taxpayers. Another 14,111 persons used the wrong tax table.

The IRS Service Center in Andgover, Massachusetts has processed 355 539 refunds so far this weet.
