The four-year scholarship, to be used in any one of 283 colleges and universities hosting Army ROTC pays for tuition, textbooks, and lab oratory fees, in addition to \$50 per month, experience allowages. month subsistence allowance

Each ROTC cadet also receives \$172 monthly, one half of a second lieutenant's pay, during the six week summer camp training between the junior and senior year
