

Budget Hearing & Regular Meeting of Village Board Held

All Board Members and Department Heads were present at the regular Village Board Meeting and Budget Hearing, Monday evening, April 13th.

No interested person or persons were present for the Budget Hearing of which due notice had been published previously, so Robert Baker submitted a resolution for adoption of the Budget as published, seconded by William Dunham, who moved that it be adopted and it was so carried by a unanimous vote.

A lengthy discussion was carried on with "Mike" Smith considering the dedication of the proposed Street in their proposed Development Area at the South end of Main St., South of Route 17, and the possibility of extension of Village Water Service. No decisions were arrived at with the matter left up for further study.

Thomas L. Polmateer Awarded ROTC College Scholarship

Thomas L. Polmateer, a resident of Andover, N. Y., has been awarded an Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) college scholarship, the Department of the Army announced today.

He is one of 368 men in the 15 State First Army Area to receive the grant out of 1,643 applicants.

The four-year scholarship, to be used in any one of 283 colleges and universities hosting Army ROTC pays for tuition, textbooks, and laboratory fees, in addition to \$50 per month subsistence allowance.

Each ROTC cadet also receives \$172 monthly, one half of a second lieutenant's pay, during the six-week summer camp training between the junior and senior year.

The grants were awarded on a competitive basis to include high school academic excellence, extracurricular activities, physical standards, results of college entrance examinations, and motivation.
