

# Senator Jess Present Announces Estimated School Aid For 1970 - 1971

State Senator Jess J. Present (R Jamestown) has announced that Allegany County School districts will receive an estimated \$827,837 in additional State Aid during the 1970-71 school fiscal year as the result of the educational assistance program adopted by the Legislature. This is an estimated 9.3 per cent increase in the educational aid currently being received by the county.

On a statewide basis, school districts will receive about \$388 million in increased assistance during their next fiscal year. Senator Present said.

Adopting various proposals advanced by Governor Rockefeller, the Board of Regents, the two education committees of the Legislature and the Joint Legislative Committee to Revise the Education Law, the program provides the financially higher of two alternatives for educational assistance during the coming year—depending on the particular characteristics

of each school district.

One alternative provides a 10 per cent increase in the operating aid at the present \$760 per pupil, \$274 operating flat grant and the 49%-state-51%-local shared cost formulas, and 100 per cent of the current size correction formula. The second alternative increases the per pupil aid ceiling to \$860 per pupil, sets the operating flat grant at \$310, maintains the 49% -51% state-local sharing and one-half of the 1969-70 size correction assistance.

In addition, transportation aid will be maintained at 90% state aid during the next year and the BOCES formula is reinstated.

In Allegany County, attached is a breakdown of the estimated assistance for school districts represented by senator Present.

The estimates include formula operating aid, urban aid, high tax rate aid. Neither figures include BOCES aid or other special type aid.

# Cluster Fly Problems?

Cluster flies are among the most elusive of household pests to effectively eliminate or control. These flies seldom come in contact with filth and are not considered an important health hazard. However, their constant buzzing and dropping into food containers and such creates an annoyance which is good enough reason for wanting to eliminate them.

Cluster flies gain entrance to homes in late summer and early fall for the purpose of hibernation for the winter. On warm days during the winter and spring, they may become active and enter living areas of the home.

Vapona strips hung in the attic are quite effective in killing them there, thus preventing much of their migration to the living areas. Directions for the use of the Vapona strips are found on the container in which purchased.

Before house flies and other insects become a problem, lowering the upper window sash a crack will allow many of these cluster flies to escape.

After emerging from winter hibernation, cluster flies flourish and produce many generations of progeny during the summer time. The larval or maggot stage of these insects is spent as a predator on certain species of earth worms. Reproduction of these flies is outside of the home. They are present in backyards and in the wild during the summertime.

As the outside temperature decreases in late summer and early fall they are stimulated to seek shelter for hibernation. This is when they enter homes through any cracks around windows, under siding or roof edges.

Even in the many seemingly tight new homes, they find ways of entering.

In late summer or by September 10, caulking of all possible cracks

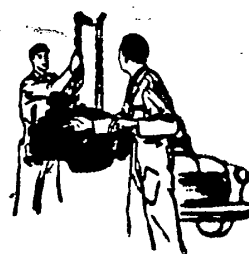
