The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Greenwood Central School, was held at the school on April 15, 1970.

A discussion was held concerning the 15 day trial re-routing of one of the bus routes. Two parents were present and gave their view-points on this re-routing. The Board decided there was not sufficient benefits to warrant making a permanent change in the route.

A 9th grade student request to be allowed to take an accelerated program, so that he might graduate with only 3 years of high school, was discussed with the Board giving tentative approval for the acceleration pending a written approval of the parents and contingent upon review by the Board upon successful completion

"Recipe For Tree Planting"

After a long, hard winter, many of us are eager to get to work in our yards as the winter snows give way to the warming Spring. Tree damaged during the winter may need replacing as soon as the ground can be worked. If that is the case, the State University College of Forestry at Syracuse University is offering a helpful leaflet with advice on planting trees, titled, "Recipe For Tree Planting".

Written by Dr. Arthur T. Viertel, associate professor of landscape architecture at the College, he explains in the leaflet that Spring and Fall are the safest seasons for planting trees.

In the Spring all trees may be moved after the ground has dried enough to be workable and before the new leaves appear. Fall planting should be planned as the trees approach their dormant stage — after they have lost their foliage. However, evergreens may be safely moved during late summer or very early fall.

Dr. Viertel carefully explains the

importance of digging the proper size hole for the tree. He states that the bottom of the hole should be as wide as its opening for the ball of earth incasing the roots. Transplanting a bare-rooted tree requires that the bottom of the hole be wider for spreading the roots.

It is important that your tree be free of any indication of insects, diseases, or major mechanical injury, and for these reasons Dr. Viertel recommends that you obtain your tree from nursery-grown stock. He also says that the hole for the tree be dug before the tree is delivered so that planting may be done immediately upon arrival. It is very important that the roots stay moist and protected from drying out, thus the need for speed.

of each year's studies.

Other items to come before the Board included: a report by Mr. Wright on the recently held in-service workshop for teachers; a discussion on a problem developing with a dry well in the sewage system; a discussion of tax-sheltered annuities for teachers which was tabled at this time; consideration of the resignation of Michael Sky as a substitute bus driver with action deferred; a discussion of group bidding on bakery products with a resolution by the Board to

participate with other Southern Tier schools in this group bid; a report by Mr. Wright concerning the E. S. E. A. Title I allocation allowing Greenwood \$12,269.59 which is \$2,101.59 more than we were led to expect; a report by Mrs. Doris Bennett, Clerk of the Board concerning the recent New York State Audit which gave a very favorable report of our business operation from July 1, 1966 through June 30, 1969.

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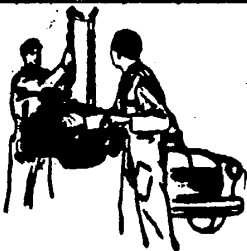
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
