This Friday and Saturday night, May 8 and 9, the Andover Central School will be the scene of the Annual Minstrel Shows. Many students and residents of Andover will attend this event, but do you know the actual history of these "Minstrel Shows?"

In its early form, it was based upon the singing and dancing of Negro Slaves.

The form of the Minstrel show was established by the Christy Company. It was a performance in two parts. The program was opened by a chorus, often with a grand entrance, and at the conclusion of the song, the "Interlocutor" commanded, "Gentlemen, be seated." Then followed a series of jokes between the Interlocutor and the Endmen". Songs and dances broke up the gags and jokes. The main instruments used to accompany the singing were the banjo and violin.

The second part consisted of a series of individual acts which concluded with a "hoe-down" in which every member of the company did a specialty number while others sang and clapped. Occasionally there was a third part to the performance consisting of a farce, burlesque, or comic opera. Sometimes this feature was placed at the end of the second part of the performance. The Minstrel Show companies eventually disappeared from the professional theatre. Its chief contribution was its "folk" music

Therefore, when you sit in the audience of our own local Minstrel Show, think back to its great heritage and its importance to our American culture. You'll appreciate the show a great deal more
