

School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday evening, May 11, by Mrs. Slade, President. Mr. Kessler and the following Board members were present: Robert Tomm, Lawrence Godown, Francis Horan and Conner Stephens.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these was made by Robert Tomm. Seconded by Lawrence Godown and carried by 5 votes of yes.

Mr. Kessler read the bills for the month of April — \$791.439 plus gas. Conner Stephens made the motion that these be paid. Francis Horan seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Cafeteria bills in the amount of \$50.66 were read by Mr. Kessler. The motion to pay these was made by Lawrence Godown and seconded by Robert Tomm. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's report was read for approval. Robert Tomm made the motion that this report be accepted as read. Francis Horan seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria report was read by Mr. Kessler showing a net loss of \$384.67 for the month of April. A motion was made by Francis Horan to file this report with the minutes. Seconded by Lawrence Godown. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The gross payrolls were read for the approval of the Board. The total was \$20,146.89. Francis Horan made the motion to accept these as read and Robert Tomm seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Francis Horan made the motion to accept the resignation of Mrs. Victoria Balding Spanish Teacher as of July 1, 1970. Lawrence Godown seconded the motion. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Robert Tomm made the motion to accept the resignation of Mrs. Trudy Schweit Jr. High Science Teacher as of July 1, 1970. Conner Stephens seconded the motion. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Francis Horan made a motion that the Board authorize Robert Tomm and Conner Stephens to attend the area School Boards Conference at Portville on May 19, 1970 and authorized the clerk to make checks for \$8.00 for dinner. Lawrence Godown seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

A letter was read from Al Barden concerning his trip to Oswego on May 7, 1970. The 32nd Annual Industrial Arts Spring Conference.

A letter was read from Mrs. Burger concerning her attendance at the New York State English Conference held at Syracuse on April 23 - 25, 1970. Both letters were appreciated and placed in the teachers file.

Robert Tomm made the motion to adjourn the meeting at 10:36. Lawrence Godown seconded. Passed by 5 yes votes.

Iroquois Tel. Corp. Moves To New Location

The Iroquois Telephone Corp. announced plans today to move June 1, from their present location on Main Street, Alfred, to a new office facility on Route 21. The new location is the former Korbloek, Conn. building.

According to George E. Housen, Manager for Iroquois Telephone, the present telephone office will be rented by Edward Crandall, owner of the College Bookstore, who plans to expand his present facilities.

The new \$55,000 telephone building will have 500 square feet of space and will house all of the 24 employees of the telephone company, which will function as Alfred District Headquarters of Continental Telephone System. All telephone company operations including the commercial, plant, cable, and construction functions will be working out of the new facility.

"Due to the expansion of facilities, and future building growth at both SUNY and Alfred University," Housen said, "We were forced to relocate from the Main Street building". Also, Housen said that a centralization of operations and the easy access to the one story building on Route 21 will facilitate smoother operations, and servicing of customers.

All local Centrex accounts will continue to be handled locally, and all payments be made to the new office building on Route 21.

Dr. Clarence W. Hardy was born January 8, 1898 at Tecumseh, Mich., and died May 7, 1970 at Peoria, Ill.

He was Health Director of Illinois State University at Normal, Ill., and a Director of the Blood Bank for the State of Illinois until his retirement in 1966 due to ill health.

He is survived by his widow, Marian Painter Hardy and sons, Dr. David L. Periam B., and William T. and several grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in Peoria, Ill., and interment was at Hutchinson, Kansas.
