All ex-servicemen are urged to come out and participate in the Memorial Observance. If that uniform doesn't fit — come out and march anyway.

Memorial Day observances have been carried out in both the North and the South since 1868, a tradition begun "to respect comrades who died in defense of their country." For many years after the try." For many years after the Civil War, the Grand Arny of the Republic in the North and the Confederate Veterans in the South took charge of Memorial Day serices in their respective commun-

wices in their respective communities.

When these organizations became unable to carry on actively these rites (which include the decoration of all known veteran grave sites), The American Legion pledged its help to the perpetuation of the annual observance of Memorial Day, Commander Tuttle explained. Although it began as an occasion to commemorate the dead of all wars, Memorial Day has since become a time for the decoration of graves of family and friends.
