BLUEBIRDS, THE ENVIRONMENT AND DDT

In addition to picking up some beer cans along a prime stretch of trout water, my personal contribu-tion to Environmental Week was to tack up a couple of bluebird houses. The New York Legislature nouses. The New York Legislature called attention to the bluebird by naming it the official State Bird and we hope the honor will not doom it to near extinction as is the case with our national bird.

Bluebirds seem to be getting scarcer according to my observations, and whether the pesticide cloud in which we live has anything to do with it remains to be seen. Certainly the demise of peregrine falcons east of the Rockies has been tied to DDT, and their population has dropped 95 per cent in the West due to the same cause. in the West due to the same cause. World populations of certain hawks are also declining at an alarming rate, and a similar drop is now being documented in oceanic birds.

ing documented in oceanic birds. Dr. Charles F. Wurster, of the State University at Stony Brook, a pesticide crusader who was instrumental in getting DDT banned in Wisconsin. explained the decline in birds in an Environmental Week lecture. DDT does not kill many birds and when it does, the killing is usually in a small area and of little significance, he said. Much the greater damage is done by disrupting the re-production cycle of rupting the re-production cycle of whole populations.

DDT has caused birds to produce thin-shelled eggs, and sterile eggs. It is responsible for abnormal be-havior such as egg eating, and

other unnatural acts that nesting to be disrupted.

Somewhat the same thing is being osberved in fish living in DDT contaminated waters — no dead ontaminated waters — no dead fish floating around, but no reproduction either. There is absolutely no lake trout reproduction in Lake George, claimed Wurster. Eggs are spawned and some hatch, but by the time the little fry obsorb the last of the yolk sac they

sorb the last of die.

Wurster laid much of the blame of DDT inaction on the U.S. Department of Agriculture, To make headlines, Wurster said, they cancelled DDT recommendations last year. DDT manufacturers appealand and the cancellation was susyear. DD1 manufacturers appear-ed, and the cancellation was sus-pended. Wurster stated that the Department of Agriculture has never successfully carried a can-cellation over a manufacturer's ap-

peal.

One of the leading crusaders of the Environmental Defense Fund Wurster is involved in bringing legal actions against pollutors and governmental agencies that look the other way. Since DDT upsets hormones and enzymes, and causes cancer in laboratory animals, the cancer in laboratory animals, the Environmental Defense Fund is working under the Delany Amendment to ban DDT contaminated food — the way cyclamates were banned.

If you like to catch fish and watch bluebirds, then put up a few bird houses and write your representatives in Albany and Washington about the pesticide problem.
