

County-Wide Sewage Study Approved by State

The comprehensive sewerage study for Allegany County has been approved by the State Health Department. It has been announced by Gene A. DeMarie, program associate for the Pure Water Program in the State Health Department.

State approval means that the study is now the official master plan of the county for all future development of sewage collection, treatment, and disposal facilities.

County comprehensive studies are completely financed by the State Health Department as part of the Pure Waters Program.

The Allegany County study was prepared by Metcalf & Eddy, New York City consulting engineering firm. In its summary of the report, the engineers point out that two-thirds of the population of the county lack municipal sewerage facilities.

The study predicts a population growth of from 44,000 in 1960 to 66,000 in 2020. To facilitate planning, the county was grouped into nine service areas according to location. The recommendations for each area are as follows:

Area I — The Canadea-Sewer District's new plant, serving the hamlet of Houghton and Houghton College, will be adequate until about 1990. Immediate construction of a sewerage system is recommended for the Rushford Lake area. Individual systems are presently adequate in Fillmore, Hume, and Rushford; if they should consider pumping their sewage to Houghton, and Rushford should join the Rushford Lake system.

Area II — Immediate construction of collection and treatment facilities is recommended for the village of Canaseraga and contiguous areas of the town of Burns. (Canaseraga has submitted an engineering report to the State Health Department and has applied for state and federal aid.)

Area III — Future construction of a joint system with Angellier pumping its sewage to a treatment plant to be constructed in Belfast.

Area IV — Expansion of the Alford plant and the addition of tertiary treatment. Use of individual systems in Alford as long as possible.

Area V — A regional system should be built around the existing Cuta plant, which should be expanded and rehabilitated immediately.

Area VI — Separate systems for Belmont and Friendship, both of which have been cited by the State Health Department for stream pollution are being constructed at present.

Area VII — Construction of an intermunicipal system for Bolivar and Richburg. Bolivar's plant should be remodeled and expanded.

Area VIII — Expansion and upgrading of the Village of Wellsville's plant, adding secondary treatment. Adjacent areas of the town have disposal problems and should seek an agreement with the

village to treat their sewage. Scio and Stannards should consider forming a joint system connected to the Wellsville plant if individual septic tanks become inadequate in the future.

Area IX — Individual systems should be used as long as they operate satisfactorily in the towns of Andover and Independence. If the need should arise, separate facilities should be constructed for the communities of Andover and Independence.

The study also recommends that a county sewer district be formed wherever possible, and that until this is done, the county planning board should be authorized to plan and promote recommended projects. Such projects would have to be approved by the municipalities involved and also by the public through a referendum.

New York Leads Maple Production

New York State has again been the leading maple producing State in the Nation with Vermont in second place. This is the third consecutive year New York held first place.

The New York Crop Reporting Service of the State Department of Agriculture and Markets has just reported maple syrup production in New York this year totaled 332,000 gallons. The total is down about five percent from last year.

The maple season in New York was very late starting and there was little sap flow until late March. Deep snow made tapping and gathering of sap difficult in early season and discouraged tapping by many sugar bush operators.

Moderate runs of high quality sap were general in late March and in early April when conditions were quite favorable for several days. Cool weather during the season was favorable for keeping sap in good condition.

A high percentage of fancy grade syrup was made this year, the report stated.

New York and Vermont collectively accounted for more than half the Nation's total 1970 crop of 1,105,000 gallons. U. S. production this year is seven percent above the 1969 production and 14 percent above 1968.

Farmers To Certify Acreage Diversions

Early certification by Allegany County farmers in the voluntary farm programs will mean earlier program payments, according to Stephen Clarke, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

Certification must be made by the disposition date of June 15 for wheat diversion and August 1 for corn. When certification is made, earlier, the certification date becomes the final farm disposition date.

Clarke cautioned farmers against guesswork. He advised that they must know their exact acreage of feed grain and wheat. They must also know the acreage diverted from wheat and feed grains, and that they have met their farms' conserving base requirements.

When a farmer certifies his diversion with the program provisions, the Allegany County ASCS Office begins processing the papers so that he will receive full payment as soon as possible after July 1. Target date for completion of 1970 farm program payments is July and August.

Certification must be exact. Spot checks may be made at any time following certification. If an error is found some or all of the program payments may be lost. After certification, adjustments cannot be made to bring acreage into compliance.

Be sure the allotment, base, or permitted acreage has not been exceeded on all farms in which the farmer has an interest Clarke said.
