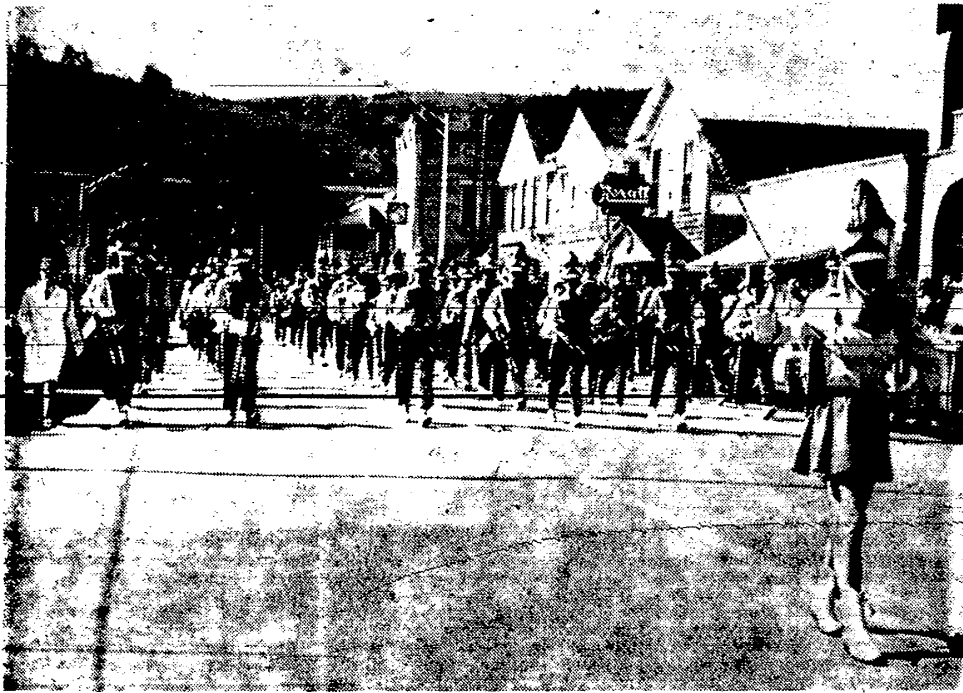

In 1450, Johann Gutenberg formed a partnership with a goldsmith, Johann Fust, and together they set up a printing press on which they started printing a large Latin Bible and some smaller books and tracts.

The famous Gutenberg Bible, as printed between the years 1455 and 1456. The finest known copy of this masterpiece was acquired by the Library of Congress in Washington, D. C. It is still on display there.

Little did Gutenberg know that his invention of movable type would make possible the distribution of hundreds of newspapers and magazines to millions of people throughout the world.

Because movable type made printing much easier and much faster, more people began reading and forming different ideas about governmental policies and their own local government.

Secfs became restless and completely unsatisfied with their lot in life. National states developed. Feudalism crumbled.
