Syracuse, N. Y. — Subterranean termites are found throughout much of the state, with the heaviest concentration found on Long Island and in the southern counties adjacent to the Hudson River.

Termites are social, colonizing insects living almost entirely inside the material on which they feed. This hidden nature of the insect makes detection difficult according to Dr. John B. Simeone, chairman of the Department of Forest Entomology at the State University College of Forestry at Syracuse University and specialist in the field of wood-destroying insects.

Dr. Simeone points out the secretive nature of the insect. No tell-tale wood powder or sawdust betrays the activity of the colony.

Collapse of damaged wood, and the swarming of winged termites accompanied by the shedding of

the wings near exit holes are evidence of their presence.

Ants are often mistaken for termites. The main difference is that ants do not lose their wings as readily as do termites. Ant workers are cream-colored; and ants have a noticeable waist, while the bodies of the termites are noticeably thicker in this region.

Because termites can build earthen tunnels over obstacles to get to wood, it is necessary to take special preventative measures to guard against attack. Both mechanical and chemical controls are covered in a revised, illustrated folder prepared by Dr. Simeone, which includes a map showing the danger areas of heavy termite attack.
