Freedom Of Imformation Bill For Newsmen

MEMORANDUM filed with Assembly Bill Number 5478-B, entitled "AN ACT" to amend the civil rights law, in relation to contempt. No. 86 (Chapter 615) — Approved.

This "Freedom of Information Bill for Newsmen" will make New York State — the Nation's principal center of news gathering and dissemination — the only state that clearly protects the public's right to know and the First Amendment rights of all legitimate newspapermen, reporters and television and men, reporters and television and radio broadcasters,

The bill protects journalists and newscasters from charges of con-tempt in any proceeding brought under State law for refusing or failing to disclose information or sources of information bbtained in the course of gathering news for publication.

The types of information that

are written, oral and pictorial information and communications concerning local, national or world-wide events or any other matter of public concern or public interest or affecting the public welfare.

Freedom of the press is one of freedom of the press is one of the foundations upon which our form of government is based. A representative democracy, such as ours, cannot exist unless there is a free press both willing and able to keep the public informed of all the news.

The threat to a newsman is being charged with contempt and of being imprisoned for failing to disbeing imprisoned for falling to dis-close his information or its sources can significantly reduce his ability to gather vital information. That this is a real and imminent threat has been demonstrated by the statements of several prominent re-porters that valuable sources of information have been cut off be-cause of recent attempts by the Federal Government to require the disclosure of information obtained disclosure of information obtained by reporters in confidence.

A Federal District Court Judge in California has recently recogn-ized as a matter of constitutional law, that the testimonial compullaw that the testimonial comput-sion of newsmen may seriously im-pinge upon or repress the First Amendment rights of freedom of speech, press and association which centuries of experience have found to be indispensable to the survival of a free society. Accord-ingly, he prohibited the Federal Government from requiring the disclosure of "confidential assoc-iations that impling upon the efdisclosure of commentary interesting exercise of treporter's)

as a compelling and overriding national interest which cannot be alternatively served has been established to the satisfaction of the court." Application of Caldwell (N. D., Cal. Misc. No. 10426, 1970). At the present time, fifteen other states have enacted legislation extending testimonial privilege to newsmen. This measure affords a stronger safeguard of the free channels of news communication than most existing legislation, by protecting newsmen from being compelled to disclose the information they gather, as well as the identity of their informants. The need to protect both information and sources was affirmed to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court in 1963 when it held that the compulsory disclosure of newsmen's in informants had been deleted, would information, even if the names of the realistically nullify the object and intent of the Pennsylvania stafute permitting reporters to refuse to disclose the identity of their sources. In re Taylor, 412 Pa. 32 (1963) The Bill is approved.
