Regents War Service Scholarships For Veterans

The Legislature has authorized a new series of 600 War Service Scholarships for veterans, effective with the 1970-71 college year. Your cooperation and assistance are requested in calling these new scholarship opportunities to the attention of eligible candidates and appropriate members of your staff. The following are the major features of these new awards:

ELIGIBILITY—Candidates must (1) be veterans who served in the armed forces (other than for training) after October 1, 1961 and have been released from active duty under conditions not other than honorable by July 10, 1970 and (2) have been residents of New York State at time of entry into military service and must be residents of New York State at the time of making application for the scholarship.

BENEFITS—Scholarship holders will receive up to \$350 a year toward tuition, for up to four years of study, full-time or part-time, at any approved college nursing school, business school, or trade or technical school in New York State. This scholarship may be held concurrently with GI benefits, but not with any other Regents

scholarship or fellowship.

BASIS OF AWARD—A competitive written examination will be held on July 10, 1970. Awards will be made to the highest ranking candidates in each county.

Congressman Hastings Reports

Washington, D. C. — A bill which would prohibit the sale of mailing lists by federal agencies was introduced in the House Tuesday, June 9, by Rep. James F. Hastings (38th Dist.-NY).

The Allegany Republican was co-sponsor of the measure which was proposed by Rep. Frank Horton (36th Dist.-NY).

The Legislation would ban the sale of names and addresses of federal employees, members of the Armed Forces or persons required to register with any federal agency unless it is certified that such a list will not be used for commercial or illegal purposes.

Rep. Hastings said that federal agencies say they are obligated to provide such information under the Freedom of Information Act, which was adopted to insure public access to all public records.

He noted, for example, that the Federal Communications Commission sells the names of licensed ham radio operators; the Federal Aviation Administration, the names of all licensed pilots; and the Coast

Guard, the names of registered boat owners.

Rep. Hastings said the proposed legislation would not clamp a lid of secrecy on such information but would establish a definite policy that such names and addresses could not be used for commercial purposes.

LIVING UNDER LAW

PEDESTRIAN COLLISION

A young man darted out of a store and ran into Barbara, knocking her down. Barbara's packages were scattered all over the sidewalk, and her arm was broken. Barbara sued the young man for her medical bills and expenses. "You can't go running around knocking people down," she said.

"I've got a right to come and go in any direction and at any speed I want to," said the young man. "Barbara should have looked before walking past the entrance of the store."

Can Barbara hold another pedestrian liable for running into her on a public sidewalk?

Yes, said the court. It is true that a pedestrian using

the public sidewalks has a right to come and go in any direction and at any pace or gait that might suit his fancy. But, in so using the sidewalk he must use care and vigilance to safeguard the interests of others lawfully using the sidewalk.

The duty of care owed by a pedestrian traveling on a public sidewalk is the same as that required of any other person in negligence cases. He has a duty to act as an ordinary person would in the same or similar circumstances. In other words, he can't run down a crowded sidewalk knocking people down.

In this case the young man had run across the sidewalk without bothering to look to either side. In so acting, he failed to meet the degree of care which the law requires in such circumstances.

Barbara won the case.
