MORE CAMPSITES FOR CAMPERS

With the family camping season upon us, the race begins to find a campsite. This season, New York State will boast 33.794 campsites — 10,298 of them in public parks, and 23, 496 in private campgrounds, according to the annual parks, and 23, 496 in private camp-grounds, according to the annual statistics compiled by the Woodall Publishing Company. While the number of campsites in New York State increases each year, we are falling behind some of the leading

California has been the long-time leader in campgrounds, and last year New York State was sec-ond. But this year Florida gained spurt of private campground de

or private tampfording actively marked than 10 per cent of Florida's campsites are public. Ohio leap-frogged into third place, again due to expansion of private campsites. New York State in the present of fourth place. is now in fourth place.

In the United States there will be some 75,000 new campsites available this year, according to Curtis Fuller, president of the Woodall Company, which compiles campground information for recreational vehicle industry.

Fuller notes a continuing increase in services at private camp-grounds. His survey indicates that two-thirds of the private camp-sites will have electrical hook-upthis year; slightly more than half will offer water hook-ups, and sew-

er hook-ups will be available at more than a quarter of the sites. Public campgrounds are usually more rustic, some are more remote, and they are slower to provide these services.

Woodall statistics are gathered in the course of annually inspecting every known privately owned park and campground in the country, for the publication of its directory. "Trailering Parks and Campgrounds" More than 30 Campgrounds". More than 30 husband-wife teams inspect the parks on their camping trips each year.

So many thousands of from coast to coast, and the listing of new facilities are of little comfort to the camping family who cannot get into an area on a special week-end. After watching the outdoor recreation boom develop for door recreation boom develop for many years, it is my opinion that there will never be enough camp sites in some areas for peak periods. Campers themselves must help spread the load, by going to different areas, off-season camping and the like.
