NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a Public Hearing will be held on a proposed Local Law in relation to the establishment of a Code of Ethics and a Board of Ethics for the County of Allegany on Monday, July 13, 1970, at 2:30 o'clock p. m. in the Legislators' Chambers, Courthouse, Belmont, New York.

Such proposed Local Law sets forth the legislative intent; the rule with respect to conflicts of interest; standards for conduct; employees; penalties for violations of the law; establishes a Board of Ethics consisting of five members; prescribes qualifications for membership; states duties of said Board; and prescribes administration of said law upon its adoption.

Nov. 1773—"Voted 15 pounds for schooling in 5 places."
1797—"Voted to give 8 cents for each crow head killed within one year" and then "voted the heads of crows killed be destroyed in the presence of the selectmen."

May 1806—½ bushel seed corn, 30c
Coffin for your son, 50c
1808—Dr. Chapins for gravestones, \$3.00
1809—Making a bridle, 46c
Mar. 1812—Six gallons of Brandy high wines, \$1.10
1823—Town paid for "one man on roads 10c an hour"

1825—Town paid for "one man and oxen per day in summer" 75c

1 bu. Twenty-ounce apples, 67c
1½ bu. small Sweets, 37c
1852—One Turkey, 87½c
Town voted \$1,000.00 for "repairing and amending Highways, Townways, and Bridges"
1853 180 ft. white oak plank at 1½c per ft., \$2.70
116 ft. hemlock, \$4.20
84 ft. pine boards, \$1.26
165 ft. pine boards, \$3.30
45 ft. oak timber, 0.77
1854—Town raised \$800.00 for schools
1855—3 turkeys, \$2.50
Town paid \$4.50 for taking census -- three days
1862—For lamb and wool from a flock of 97 ewes, \$800.00
1869 "Sold 90 handsome lambs for \$925.00 (They were fed equal parts of oil meal and Indian meal)"
Nov. 1874 "I W. Barnard & Son sold their 1873 crop of tobacco to James M. Crafts for 18, 10, and 5 cents. It was manufactured at once into cigars by Mr. Craft who said he never saw better quality leaf"
