## 1971 College-Bound Students

The 25th Annual National competition for the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corp (NROTC) College Scholarship Program has commenced.

The NROTC College Scholarship Program prepares a young man for a Navy or Marine Corps commission while he is studying at one of the many civilian colleges and universities where NROTC Units are established. All tuition, fees, uniforms, and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives \$50 per month subsistence allowance for four years. During the summers between academic years, the student participates in interesting at-sea training periods as a Midshipman. After successfully completing a baccalaureate level college course and all military requirements, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps.

Applicants for this program will be considered based on scores obtained on either the Scholarship Aptitude Test (SAT) of the College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB), Princeton, New Jersey or the American College Test (ACT) of the American College Testing Program, Iowa City, Iowa, in lieu of the Navy College Aptitude Test (NCAT) previously utilized.

Applicants for the 1971 NROTC College Scholarship Program must — Apply for and take either test specified above at their own expense prior to 31 December 1970.

— Arrange with the appropriate testing agency for the submission of their scores to the NROTC College Scholarship Program.

— Apply for the NROTC College Scholarship Program between 1 April 1970 and 1 December 1970 in accordance with the 1971 Bulletin of Information.

## Tax Fax

At midyear there are some changes taking place you may have forgotten about. We have listed these below as a reminder.

Some of you have received various notices about paying estimated taxes or that your next quarterly payment is due. Farmers do not have to file or pay "estimated taxes" if they filed by the "farming" date — March 1, 1970 — normally, February 15.

However, farm employees, including your son or others who are on pretty much a fixed income, must make their regular quarterly estimate payments. Some are being sought out and fined for not doing so. We have a few forms left.

The surtax ended June 30. You will compute your surtax on an average rate of 2.5% for 1970.

An increase in tax exemption now pertains to those with low income. Anyone who earns less than \$1,725 during 1970 will not have to pay any Federal Income tax — students included. In 1969 — \$900. was the lowest figure. You don't have to pay now and retrieve later. Your children you employ get like treatment.

You do not withhold Federal

Income tax from farm employees.

Under law changes, working students — starting May 1-1970 — are not subject to withholding.

1. He paid no tax in 1969.
2. He expects to pay no tax in 1970.

He should file for a

Withholding Exemption Certificate, with his employer, farm or non-farm alike. This status means he does not wait until next spring for a refund.

Minimum Wages are changing. Effective July 1, 1970 the minimum non-farm wage is \$1.85 per hour. The minimum for farm workers is \$1.40 per hour. It will go to \$1.50 on February 1, 1971.

You must pay minimum wages if you paid over \$1,200 in wages last year.
