McDonald, acting director of the Division for Youth, expressed her satisfaction with the growing interest in development of community recreation programs of community recreation programs around the state; she noted that the amount of State aid furnished by the State of New York has increased from \$6.5 million in 1968 to \$7.3 million last year, for the establishment, operation, and maintenance of 1,400 municipal youth bureaus, recreation projects and youth service projects and youth service projects.

Howard Burdick, Supervisor of Howard Burdick, Supervisor of the Town of Andover, and James Mulholland, Mayor of the Village of Andover indicated in the joint application for State aid that a total of \$1579.40 will be spent to provide organized youth activities.
