Mr. Redmond designed a Christmas show with fluorescent lighting and carols around a "Star of the East" theme and a show on mathematical symmetry of celestial mechanics featured his own composing using harmonics based on the movements of the planets. In his four years Mr. Redmond entertained and instructed 41,500 people - 90 per cent of them school children who came from a 100 mile radius around the college. He is the author of the New Method of Teaching Mathematics to elementary school children and an article about it has been accepted for publication by the "Instructor" magazine in Dansville. He was granted a scholarship and is working on a book of nature study showing the mathematical designs of the common weed. Mr. Redmond was Planetarium Director at the Hudson River Museum in Yonker for ten years before going to Geneseo. Mr. and Mrs. Redmond live on their farm on Andover Hill.

Syracuse, N. Y. - Needle rust of red pine is an unsightly fungus growth that damages needles, but rarely kills trees. Dr. Savel Silverberg, professor of forest pathology at the State University College of Forestry at Syracuse University has prepared a leaflet describing this foliage disease.

During May and early June, small, white, sac-like bodies push their way through the diseased areas on the needles, breaking open to release orange-colored masses of spores. The fungus-producing spores are wind-blown to leaves of the common goldenrod or aster plants, where the fungus

is established. Needle rust cannot spread from one pine to another directly, therefore the need of the intermediate plant host.

Although no practical, complete control of needle rust is known, disposing of goldenrod and aster plants in the vicinity of red pine up to 1,000 feet of more for plantation growers is recommended - will do much to control the spread of the fungus. The rust fungus spreads to the pines only during the late summer and early autumn.

The appearance of pitch or resin dripping from spruce tree trunks or branches could indicate the presence of spruce canker, a fungus disease that may kill the trees. The fungus usually enters the trees through injuries in the bark caused by insects, rubbing branches, and mechanical injuries. According to Dr. Savel Silverberg, professor of forest pathology at the State University College of Forestry at Syracuse University, trees most often affected include the Colorado, Koster blue, and Norway spruce. Dr. Silverberg has prepared a leaflet, "Spruce Canker" which describes the disease which usually attacks spruce more than 15 years old.

Two types of Cankers - branch and trunk - plague growers of spruce. At present, plant pathologists have no positive method to cure severely cankered trees. The disease commonly appears in the lower part of the trees and spreads upward along one side in its early stages. Branch canker usually occurs between the trunk and the end

of the branch bearing the green foliage, consequently there is no value in attempting to save a portion of a diseased branch. All diseased branches should be removed and destroyed. This should be done only during periods of low humidity as the spores of the fungus causing the disease are released from the cankers during periods of damp weather.

Spraying the lower branches of valuable ornamental spruce trees weekly with an 8-8-100 Bordeaux mixture, starting in the early spring and continuing until early summer, should help to reduce the chances of infection.

Dr. Silverberg states that vigorous trees seem to be less susceptible to the disease, and he includes helpful information on proper tree care in his revised publication.
