New York State Fair Announce Deadline For Entries

Superintendent of the Home Arts, Sewing and Creative Cooking competition have announced that deadlines for entries are not far off and urge those who wish to try for prizes in the 1970 State Fair to request entry blanks without delay.

All such forms may be obtained from the Entry Department, State Fair Syracuse. The deadline for Crafts, Home Arts and Senior Citizens is August 8 and for Creative Cooking, August 18. Mrs. Gerald Twentyman has announced that the grand prize in crafts is \$150, and total prize money offered amounts to \$1935. Categories include weaving, ceramics, rugs, wall hangings, metal, wood and creative stitchery.

Total prize money offered in Home Arts is \$2,037, with categories in infants and children's garments, adult sewing, teen-age sewing, knitting quilting and other types of needle work. The Senior Citizens competition covers much the same type of creative items, according to Mrs. George Disko, superintendent of this department.

In addition to ribbons awarded in Creative Cooking, cash prizes will total \$1,584, with a grand prize consisting of an 18 cubic foot freezer donated by Agway, Inc. There are also 16 special prizes including such things as wall ornaments, silver trays, baked goods and small kitchen equipment. Mrs. Walter Butcher, superintendent, has listed 97 categories, and each contestant may enter in up to 10 of them.

Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) I just got my refund. Does that mean my return was OK?

A) The fact that you have your refund means your return contained all the information required to process it. Later, you may be asked to verify the accuracy of an item on your return, but it is not IRS policy to hold up refunds until a decision on whether to examine a return is made.

Q) Shouldn't my employer reduce my withholding now that I've had my 65th birthday?

A) You are entitled to an extra exemption for age which will reduce your tax withholding. To make this change, fill out a new withholding certificate, Form W-4, and give it to your employer.

Q) Will profits from a sale of stock be taxed higher this year under the new law?

A) The alternative capital gains tax has been increased. However, up to \$50,000, (\$25,000 for a married person filing a separate return), capital gains will be taxed at the same 24 percent alternative rate as they have in the past. Gains over \$50,000 will be taxed at a 28½ percent rate for 1970. In 1971, the alternative capital gains tax rate will go up to 32½ percent. Capital gains will be taxed at an effective maximum rate of 35 percent in 1972.

Q) Where can I get a copy of the new withholding rates that are effective July 1, 1970 so that I can adjust my payroll?

A) The new withholding rates are in Circular E (Rev. June 1970) which is being mailed to employers throughout the country. Extra copies may be obtained at your IRS district office.

Q) What do you have to prove to deduct moving expenses?

A) Two basic conditions must be met to qualify for moving ex-

Why Go Fishing?

Why go fishin'? Presumably to catch fish, though some wives may suspect that it is more to get out of cleaning the cellar or doing some other task she thinks should be done. To look at some fishing spots along the shore, you might suspect that some of the previous occupants of the site had been there more to drink beer than to catch fish.

Some fishermen claim that it is the only way that they can find undisturbed peace and quiet to think. "Peace and quiet" part plays a large part for, to many people, the greatest value from fishing comes in the escape from the tensions and anxieties of our modern life. The fish is an excuse, and welcome gravy if they are fortunate enough to get one.

To say fish isn't the prime reason for going fishing may be blasphemy, but facts speak for themselves. Ten percent of the fishermen catch 90 percent of the fish. The remaining 90 percent of the fishermen must find something to keep them going, or the number of fishermen wouldn't continue to increase. Hot summer days, when most families must take their vacations, are among the poorest for fishing. This must mean that Mr. Average Fisherman often comes home empty handed.

During fishing doldrums, if you don't have something important to think about, you can find plenty

of deductions. First, your new place of employment must be 50 miles farther from your old home than your previous place of employment. To state this another way, you would meet this requirement if it would be 50 miles farther to go from your old home to your new job than it was before you changed jobs.

The other requirement is that you be a full-time employee at your new job for at least 39 weeks of the 12 months following your move.

To meet these requirements it is not necessary to have your job before you move. They can be met by persons moving to look for work as well as those who are either transferred to a new location or accept a new job that requires them to move.

Q) I greatly increased the value of my property this spring by putting in a number of ornamental shade and fruit trees. Can I get tax credit for what I spent?

A) Although these expenses cannot be deducted they can be capitalized and added to the cost basis of your property. Only those costs which increased the value of the property can be added, however. The expense of maintaining your home may not be deducted or capitalized.

to watch if you learn to keep your eyes open. To let your mind wander from your line to what is going on around you may cost you a fish once in awhile. The pleasure and peace of mind you will get from observing the actions of other inhabitants of the area will go a long way toward restoring your soul so that you can face the work-a-day world again.

Good fish ponds, particularly warm water ponds, attract many types of life which can be fascinating to watch even if you can't call them by their proper names. Real life dramas can take your mind off worldly problems, and that is probably why you go fishing in the first place.

The Little Green Heron fishing the water at the edge of the cattails is the picture of patience. A frog's head parts floating vegetation just out of reach. Almost imperceptively one long leg is moved forward, its neck tenses and coils then, faster than the eye can see, the heron lashes forward and has the frog in its bill. Several gulps later, the bulge that was a frog disappears down the long neck and the heron resumes its quiet watchfulness.

Each form of wildlife has its main periods of activity, and as the days slip by different faces will appear on the scene. When the sun gets halfway to its zenith, the duck with her brood of young, that was feeding at the edge of the pond in the early morning mist, has disappeared in the tall vegetation and been replaced by swallows and kingfishers. During the heat of the day turtles will be sunning on old logs and muskrat houses in the shallows.

Take a break and go in where the water is shallow and teeming with small aquatic life. On one occasion like this I was watching a small school of minnows drifting unconcernedly when I noticed a little two-inch pickerel waiting motionless in the shadow of a floating leaf a few feet away. As the minnows drifted by the leaf there was a flash as the predator was on its prey. The commotion lasted only a moment, and the minnows were again quietly drifting a few feet from the pickerel which was resting calmly with a minnow's tail still protruding from its mouth.

As the shadows lengthen, turtles will retire and be replaced by the muskrat, which will swim with its tail just breaking the water and go about its business just as long as the observer remains quiet. Bats will come out to replace swallows, skimming the water surface for evening insects.

Landfill Operator Agrees To Cease Violations Of State's Sanitary Code

The operator of a refuse disposal area in Allegany County has voluntarily agreed to take action to cease violations of the state's sanitary code and stream standards.

At an informal meeting held recently at the Rochester regional office of the newly formed State Department of Environmental Conservation, J. Emmett Karl of Bolivar, operator of a landfill in Bolivar and Little Genesee, agreed to a timetable established by Department officials. The new Department took over the pollution abatement programs of the State Health Department July 1. The landfill is the disposal area for the City of Olcott in Cattaraugus County.

Present at the meeting were Karl, his attorney, Paul B. Kelly of Allegany; John Reyda, sanitarian at the Hornell District Office of the State Health Department; Dennis Sugumele, engineer in charge of industrial waste at the Rochester office of the Environmental Conservation Department, and Stanley Gubner, engineer responsible for solid waste programs at the same office.

The State officials cited inspections of the landfill operation which showed the organic waste is leaching into a stream flowing into the Little Genesee Creek, in violation of both the State's stream standards under Article 12 of the Public Health Law and Part 19 (refuse disposal) of the State Sanitary Code.

Under the schedule established, Karl will:

— by Oct. 1, 1970, hire an engineer

— by Feb. 1, 1971, submit approvable preliminary engineering plans to correct the leaching problem;

— by June 1, 1971, submit final plans and specifications;

— by Oct. 1, 1971, complete construction of improvements to the disposal area.

Department officials noted that closing down the landfill operation would not solve the problem, since leaching would continue to occur.

Karl said that he leases the land annually from Clifford Day of Little Genesee.
