

School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday evening, August 10 by Francis Horan, President. Mr. Kessler and the following Board members were present: Mr. Walker and Mrs. Slade.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by Mrs. Slade and seconded by Mr. Walker. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Payrolls totalling \$11,920.58 were read for approval of the board. Mr. Walker made the motion to approve these payrolls as read and Mrs. Slade seconded the motion. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Clerk's and Treasurer's reports were read. Mrs. Slade made the motion to approve the reports as read and Mr. Walker seconded the motion.

The monthly bills for July totalling \$6,607.94 plus utilities were read by Mr. Kessler for the Board's approval. A motion to pay these bills was made by Mr. Walker and seconded by Mrs. Slade. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Mrs. W. L. (Mary) Barnes, Hanover Hill Road, Wellsville, has accepted the position of Assistant Coordinator for Informational Center for Rural Senior Citizens. The selection of Mrs. Barnes was based on her dynamic success in developing the projects "Dollar Stretcher Plan" and her capabilities in meeting other priority needs of the program as a part-time Program Supervisor for the Project", the Coordinator said.

College Proficiency Exams To Be Given October 8 - 9

College proficiency examinations in nine separate fields will be given in various testing centers throughout New York State on October 8 and 9, the State Education Department announced today. Applicants aiming at college credit may take examinations in history, languages, literature, education, natural sciences, Freshman English, accounting, nursing sciences and applied music.

Proficiency examinations can make it possible for individuals to earn college credit and meet teacher certification or other job requirements through study or experience outside of regular college courses. The program was established by the Regents to enable individuals to obtain college credit or other educational advantages without formal classroom preparation. From 1963 to 1969, over 4,000 exams were administered and it is anticipated that over 5,000 exams will be given in 1970 alone. Any person who thinks he is qualified may take examinations.

More than 150 colleges and universities in New York State and many from out-of-state recognize these examinations for credit. Credits have been given to practical nurses earning credit or advanced standing, registered nurses using this method for credit toward a baccalaureate degree, and to Spanish speaking people gaining credit toward New York City and State licenses in Spanish. Professional education requirements are being met in this manner and students involved in higher education opportunity programs are validating their competence through these exams.

College proficiency examinations are developed and graded by outstanding faculty members from New York colleges and universities, under the guidance of specialists in the Department's Bureau of Higher and Professional Educational Testing. The tests usually correspond to material covered in one or more semesters of a college course.

Proclamation By The Governor

The period of August 10 - 16 has been designated as "Farm Safety Week" by Governor Rockefeller in a proclamation citing efforts in New York State to reduce the farm-accident toll.

Noting that increased use of power equipment on the farm and the productivity of the farmer," the Governor added:

"Unfortunately, it has also brought an increase in the accidents on farms. Recognizing the need for improvement, we in the Empire State have established the New York State Advisory Council on Farm Labor Safety, which has been engaged in a study of the problem of safety on the farm and is making recommendation for its solution. The Council recently completed an extensive accident survey on farms in 11 counties throughout the State."

A 1970 bill signed by the Governor extended the life of the Advisory Council until 1972. Among other farm organizations supporting the original legislation creating the Advisory Council was the New York State Rural Safety Council, about which the Governor said:

"Composed of members appointed by 25 farm organizations, the (Rural Safety) Council has pioneered in this area since its inception in 1954 through educational programs in the schools and other activities designed to focus public attention on safety in the rural communities."

Golden Knights To Perform At State Fair

The Golden Knights of the U.S. Army Parachute Team, who hold 87 out of 128 men's world parachuting accuracy records and have produced two world and five national parachuting champions, will perform again at the New York State Fair this year.

The precision team will perform on the first three days of the Fair, Sept. 1, 2, and 3, beginning at 4 p. m. They will jump from an altitude of 13,000 feet in front of the Grandstand.

The jumpers free fall for up to 70 seconds at speeds of 120 miles to 180 miles per hour. By moving their arms, shoulders, and legs they remain in complete control of their fall.

Once they put their ripcords, they fly their highly maneuverable Para-Commander canopies in for pinpoint landings, a skill many of the team's competition jumpers have perfected to where they have made up to eight dead centers in a row on a target only 100 millimeters in diameter.

When it comes to parachuting

the Golden Knights like to say they can do everything in the air that an airplane can except go back up. It is only a slight exaggeration. Each man is an expert who can link up with other jumpers in the air, glide for miles across the sky while in free fall, fly in formation with other jumpers, and perform other aerial maneuvers.

Over half of the Golden Knights team have served in combat zones, many with valor. And regardless of his jumping ability, each man must have an outstanding record both personal and military, for assignment to the team.

To become a Golden Knight, a man must have at least 200 free-fall jumps and be a volunteer from the Army's elite airborne units, the Paratroopers or the Green Berets.

In addition to the records they hold, the Golden Knights have represented the Army on every U.S. National Parachute Team, and a Golden Knight was captain of the U.S. Team that in 1968 won the United States' first over-all team gold medal in the World Parachute Meet.

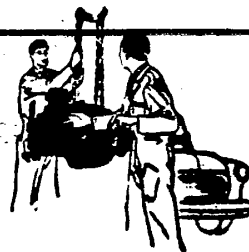

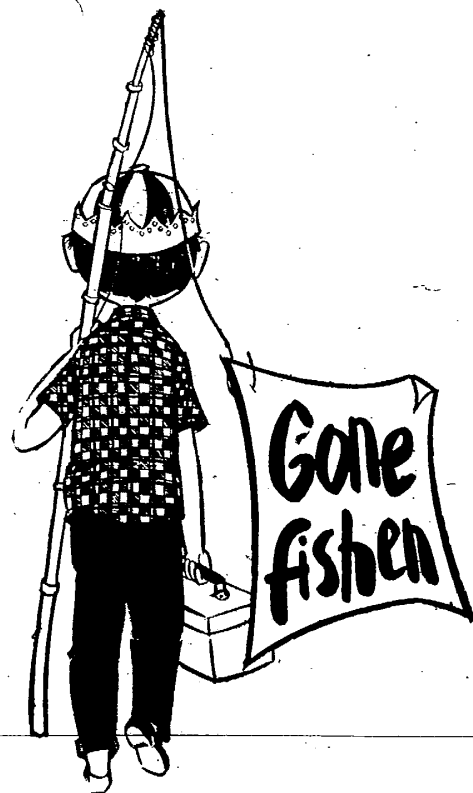
