

Yta negative blood occurs approximately twice in every 1,000 people According to Dr Roger Blaisdell, Allegany County Red Cross blood chairman, eight Red Cross blood centers in three areas are equipped to meet this need Last fall Griffis Air Force Base. near Rome, New York requested from the national Rare Blood Donor Registry, three units of group O, Rh positive. Yta negative blood. One unit was furnished by Dr. Allan Kliman of the Massachusetts center, who is a frequent donor of center, who is a frequent donor of this type of blood. The Rochester Red Cross center had identified two units of Yta negative blood. two units of Yta negative blood. One had been sent to the national rare blood donor registry and at that time preparations were being made to freeze the unit. However, it was immediately sent to Griffsis The other unit had been retained in Rochester and shipped directly to the Air Force Base.
