Dr. Charles H. Russell Named Project Director

Dr. Charles H. Russell, associate director of the National Commission for the Study of Nursing and Nursing Education. has been named project director of a study to determine the direction need for planning in nursing education in 214-county area surrounding Rochester.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has granted \$32.680 to the project, which was organized by the Community Planning Committee on Nursing Education of the Genesee Valley Nurses Association. This is the first HEW grant ever awarded to a community group for a study.

Members of the Community Planning Committee on Nursing Education are appointed by the

Genesee Valley hirses Associa-tion and represent health agencie state government, industry, ed. cation, human relations, public relations, and the medical and nuise ing professions.

Dr. Russell will maintain offices in the Bishop Kearney Education Building at St. Mary's Hospital while directing this regional study. The 14 counties cooperating in the study are: Genesee, Livings ton, Monroe, Ontario, Orleans, Se., eca, Wayne, Wyoming, Yates, Steuben, Chemung, Schuyler, Tompkins and Allegany.
