A special prayer was given by Clarence Treleven of Warren, brother-in-law of the groom. Miss Christine Bergerson, soloist, was accompanied by Miss Cindy Preston, the organist.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a long sleeved, tiered Chantilly lace gown, featuring a sabrina neckline trimmed with cuplets and pearls. Dr. Charles H. Russell Named Project Director

Dr. Charles H. Russell, associate director of the National Commission for the Study of Nursing and Nursing Education, has been named project director of a study to determine the direction need for planning in nursing education in a 14-county area surrounding Rochester.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has granted \$32,680 to the project, which was organized by the Community Planning Committee on Nursing Education of the Genesee Valley Nurses Association. This is the first HEW grant ever awarded to a community group for a study.

Members of the Community Planning Committee on Nursing Education are appointed by the

Genesee Valley Nurses Association and represent health agencies, state government, industry, education, human relations, public relations, and the medical and nursing professions.

Dr. Russell will maintain offices in the Bishop Kearney Education Building at St. Mary's Hospital while directing this regional study.

The 14 counties cooperating in the study are: Genesee, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Orleans, Seneca, Wayne, Wyoming, Yates, Steuben, Chemung, Schuyler, Tompkins and Allegany.

Florence and Doris Mullen were calling on Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Mehlender of Call Hill, Monday evening.

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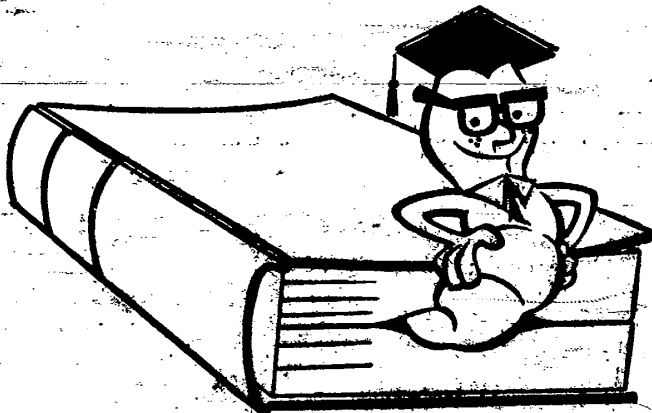
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
