### New York State Police News

The New York State Police, authorized by a 1970 act of the Legislature to accept bail for the first time in cases of traffic violations and minor misdemeanors, began the exercise of its new powers September 1.

Superintendent William E. Kirwan said the new bail procedure would be convenient to both the State Police and the offenders.

Until now, bail could be accepted only by the Court or local police departments. They will continue to accept bail when they are more convenient to a place of arrest than a State Police station.

The new law will end time-consuming delays in locating a magistrate at odd hours on traveling a long distance to reach a local police station.

In most cases, the present prac-

tice of issuing 'Uniform Traffic Tickets for traffic violations without requiring bail will be continued. Under a directive by Superintendent Kirwan, troopers will require bail if, in the opinion of the arresting officer, the offenders might fail to appear before the Court on the required date.

The amount of bail that will be required for traffic violations and minor misdemeanors shall be uniform and will be consistent with the law, and normally will range from \$20 to \$100.
