

## Village Board Special Meeting

A Special Meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office September 18, 1970.

Present were: James F. Mulholland, Mayor; Elmo Barden, Trustee; Glenn Thorp, Trustee; Robert Baker, Trustee; William Duham, Trustee; absent: Also Present, William Woodruff, James Kessler, Walter Cash and Orville Mesler.

Meeting was called to order by Mayor Mulholland.

A discussion followed in reference to T.V. situation in the Village of Andover. Moved by Barden, seconded by Glenn Thorp, that the Village grant the Allegany Video their increase in rates to \$5.50 per month, once they have purchased the Addison T.V. system and have made available, the new 12 channel system to its subscribers and are operating under conditions of existing franchise now owned by Addison T.V. Cable Co. Motion carried unanimously.

Further discussion was held by Village Board with representatives of 3-Way T.V. system and the Board has asked the 3-Way system to submit to the Village, a certificate of Insurance and also to franchise with the Village, so that the Village would be able to protect the existing 3-Way system and also have an agreement in writing for future Village Boards reference.

Moved by Glenn Thorp, seconded by Robert Baker, to issue a Bldg. Permit to James Mulholland to build a wood frame bldg. 24 ft. by 24 ft. on his property on Church St. Carried.

The Board granted Gary Brown one week vacation with pay prior to usual time. Second week without pay. Paul Bissell will in turn be paid for covering for 2 weeks period while Brown is away.



Dear Editor:

The day for the second March for Victory in Washington, D. C., has been set for October 3rd. Thousands are expected to throng to the Capital that day to rally the sentiment in these United States in behalf of decent, law-abiding, God-trusting citizens.

On April 4th of this year, the first Victory March took place in Washington with over 100,000 persons participating. Buses loaded with patriotic Americans with their Bibles, American flags and banners came from all corners of the U.S. — Florida, Mississippi, Minnesota, and even chartered planes from California. This coming march is expected to exceed the last one, hoping for 500,000 strong.

The March for Victory, October 3rd, presents the opportunity and the challenge to all who fear God and trust in Him to rally together in the nation's capital and let their voices be heard in spite of news suppression and the increasing abuse heaped upon those who would stand for peace by victory.

Many of the American Legion Posts and Veterans of Foreign Wars are concerned about our prisoners and want victory in Vietnam to bring these patriots home. Do they plan to leave those poor defenseless men there to suffer more abuse? Then after we have left the south Vietnam people to their despair, which surely would be forthcoming in the hands of the Communists, would there be any hope at all for these men to be reunited with their loved ones?

If we pull out will those that have given their lives have died in vain? This has not been the American way in the past. Even our generals have said we can win this war. The Vice President of Vietnam, General Ky, is coming to Washington for this march and will give a major address. It will be interesting to hear what he has to say about victory in Vietnam.

This is an appeal to all to make their plans to be there at the march, or, if they cannot physically be there, to provide money to send someone in their place. A bus, 41 passenger with lavatory, has been chartered for this trip which will leave Olean the evening of October 2nd, stopping in Wellsville at midnight, Coudersport at 12:30 A. M. and then continuing on to Washington.

## PSC O.K.'s Use Of Large Gas Main By Joyce Pipe Line

The Public Service Commission has authorized Joyce Pipeline Company, of Andover, to resume use of the 17,000 foot gas transmission pipeline which it laid a year ago in Steuben County.

Authorization, however, stipulates that no further gas may flow through the line until after it has been buried to a depth of at least 24 inches. A portion of the line, including about 200 feet on either side of points where it crosses highways has been buried, but the remainder is still above ground.

The Commission's order further requires the company to make a walking inspection of the entire line at least once each month and to file specified data in monthly reports to it. The authority granted today is valid until July 1, 1971.

The Commission's authorization for further operation of the pipeline is based upon the determination that its use could help augment current gas supplies.

Last November, in an emergency action aimed at minimizing hazards which could result from pressures which were building up in the well which started flowing prematurely, the Public Service Commission authorized Joyce Pipeline to utilize, until March 31, 1970, some 17,000 feet of high-pressure transmission line which interconnect that well and the transmission pipeline of Home Gas Company.

The well was shut-in last March 30 and, in conformity with a 1969 PSC order, the line was then deactivated.

Last month, however, the company indicated that due to the difficulties it experienced with salt water blocking the gas flow, it has not been able to dispose of the marketable gas from the well by the March 31 deadline and therefore could not adequately reduce the well pressure. As a result it applied for authority for further use of the pipeline.

The well involved is located in the Town of Hartsville in Steuben County. The connection with the Home Gas pipeline is in nearby West Greenwood.

The well was drilled under authority of the former State Conservation Department. The gas strata was struck at a level substantially above that which had been anticipated with the result that gas began to flow from it before casing could be installed and the well blew for about one week before it was possible to install casing and to cap it on a temporary basis.

Meanwhile, Joyce Pipeline, fearing that a hazardous condition would exist unless the top-hole, shut-in pressure of the well was relieved by delivery of gas to the Home pipeline, constructing a 17,000 foot high-pressure transmission line and obtained PSC authority to use it on a temporary basis because of emergency conditions.

Before acting on the original petition, PSC staff personnel inspected the line and directed the company to bury 200 feet of it on each side of two road crossings as a safety precaution.
