Turkey Season Dates Announced

The wary wild turkey — New York's largest game bird — will be fair game in all or parts of eight counties this fall, according to Henry L. Diamond, Commissioner of Environmental Conservation. From November 2 through 14 turkeys may be taken in Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Chemung, Schuyler and Steuben Counties, as well as that part of Erie County south of Route 20-A and east of the State Thruway and that part of Delaware County lying south and west of a continuous line beginning at the Delaware-Broome County border, extending along Route 17 to Route 10, along Route 10 to Route 28 and along Route 28 to the Delaware-Ulster County border.

Hunters are reminded that a free special permit is required in addition to the 1970-71 small game hunting license in order to take part in this hunt. Applications are available at all license issuing agencies. Applications must be made by mail no later than October 26, 1970.

To get his free permit, the applicant must include with his application the portion of his small game license marked "turkey permit stub". In the case of a non-resident hunting license, however, a separate turkey permit stub is provided. Applications should be mailed in the envelope provided.

The regulations are similar to those of previous years.

Only longbows or shotguns loaded with No. 4, 5, or 6 shot may be used. Neither rifles nor pistols are permitted.

— Turkey calls and camouflage clothing is not required, but strongly recommended.

If a turkey is taken, it must be immediately tagged — as has long been the case with deer and bear. Successful hunters also must send in one lower leg (below the "drum stick") from their bird, including the foot.

All permit holders must return the postpaid reporting form by November 17, whether or not they took a bird and whether or not they went afield. This information obtained from sportsmen on turkey hunting activity is of great value to the Department and provides one factor in determining future season recommendations.

Experienced turkey hunters have learned that the use of a turkey call, available at most sporting goods stores, adds to their enjoyment of the sport. The satisfaction derived when a wild turkey accepts the call of a hunter as that of another wild bird will be long remembered. The most effective technique of calling wild turkeys in the fall is to attempt to call together the members of a flock after they have been scattered by hunters.

To do this requires skill. In fact, many sportsmen regard turkey hunting as the ultimate challenge in the pursuit of game. Wild turkeys are extremely wary, have excellent eyesight and are a fast-moving target. It takes all the skill and patience a hunter has to bag a bird. But, as any successful hunter will tell you: "It was well worth it."
