

Bow Hunters Stamp Now Available

New York's bow hunters — more than 40,000 of them — have started lining up for the special stamps which permit them to hunt big game with bow and arrow for two weeks before the regular big game season.

The stamp is on sale, in time for the new license year beginning October 1. It costs \$3.25, and is available wherever hunting licenses are sold.

The 1970-71 special archery stamp gives bow hunters a jump on other big game hunters — and for good reason. Because bow hunting requires quiet and skillful stalking, New York State allows bow hunters two weeks of needed quiet before the gun hunters arrive. The bow-hunting season begins on October 11 in the Northern zone and on October 31 in the Southern zone.

The regular big game season begins October 25 in northern sections of the state, and November 16 in southern sections. It closes December 1.

The red and black stamp, about the size of a commemorative postage stamp, depicts New York's two big game animals, the whitetail deer and the black bear, within a stylized bow and arrow design. The stamp was designed by Wayne Trimm, an Environmental Conservation Department staff artist who has won many awards for his wildlife illustrations.

Last year's stamp, also designed by Trimm, was issued to more than 46,000 bow hunters, who bagged a total of 1,241 deer during the 1969 season.

Two Area Colleges Receive \$ \$ Grants

Rep. James F. Hastings (38th Dist.-NY) has announced that grants totalling \$106,666 have been awarded to the Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred, N. Y., and to the Corning, N. Y., Community College.

The Allegany Republican said the monies will be used by both schools for the purchase of occupational educational equipment. The grants, amounting to \$53,333 for each school, were made by the Appalachian Regional Commission.

Rep. Hastings said Corning Community College will use the funds for equipment in its courses in electrical technology, metallurgy and retail business as well as machine tools and chemical technology classes.

At Alfred Tech, the funds will help in the acquisition of materials to expand its auto mechanics program, for which, there are presently 120 students on a waiting list.

In addition, the school will purchase additional materials to provide training on gasoline and heavy diesel trucks.

The two grants were part of an overall allocation of \$195,039 awarded by the Appalachian Regional Commission to six two-year schools in the Appalachian Region of New York State.

New Law Gives Traffic Court Greater Authority

State Motor Vehicle Commissioner Vincent L. Tofany has outlined new legislation designed to give traffic court judges greater authority in sentencing violators.

He said that beginning next January 1, any motorist convicted of a non-parking traffic violation may be sentenced by the court to attend an approved driver improvement clinic.

If the clinic is operated by local authorities, the judge will also be authorized to impose a tuition charge. Both of these provisions were included in a Vehicle and Traffic Law amendment approved by the 1970 Legislature.

In discussing these changes at a meeting of the State Magistrates Association, Commissioner Tofany said that the authority to require such training "where advisable can help to reform these drivers before they reach the point where the law requires suspension or revocation of their licenses."

He said the potential revenue allowed by this amendment should encourage the formation of additional driver improvement clinics, "which in turn can play an active role in recruiting interest and support for traffic safety."

Buyers Take Note — File For Reference

Housewives and other consumers who contract for purchases as the result of door-to-door salesmanship are given a three-day think-it-over grace period under a 1970 law recommended by Governor Rockefeller that became effective September 1, 1970.

Under the new statute any consumer making a purchase on credit after home solicitation will have three days to reconsider his purchase and, if he chooses, cancel the contract.

The Governor urged enactment of the law, as part of his consumer-protection program this year, because, he said, "although door-to-door selling is a bona fide method of merchandising, it is susceptible to abuse by unscrupulous persons."

"High pressure sales tactics are often used to persuade people to sign contracts obligating them to pay large sums of money they cannot afford for merchandise they do not need."

"By giving the buyer a short period in which to reflect upon his purchase, the law will restrict abuses in this type of credit selling."

4-H Achievement Day To Be Held October 3rd

The 1970 Allegany County 4-H Achievement Day is scheduled for Saturday afternoon, October 3, at the Belmont Central School. Registration is at 12:45 P. M.

This is a special day set aside to conclude a successful project year for the approximately 900 Allegany County 4-H members and 110 adult and junior volunteer leaders. It, also, is planned as a celebration to introduce National 4-H Week October 4 - 10.

Achievement pins will be presented to 1, 5 and 10 year members. Every other member who completes at least 1 project and completes a record of his work will receive a certificate.

County medals will be awarded for proficiency in subject matter areas as well as for outstanding contributions in citizenship and junior leadership.

A special education feature will include individual demonstrations by Erie County 4-H members.

\$58 Million In Highway Bids To Be Opened By State October 8

The details of seven highway and bridge projects for which bids will be opened on October 8 have been released by State Transportation Commissioner T. W. Parker.

The projects have a total estimated cost of \$58,056,000 and will involve construction or other improvements to transportation facilities in 11 counties, as previously announced by Gov. Rockefeller.

The proposed contracts and their estimated costs include construction of the Western Expressway (Interstate 490) and related work for 4.9 miles in Monroe County \$30,000,000; and construction of 5.1 miles of graded embankments for future Southern Tier Expressway pavement in Allegany and Steuben Counties, \$13,800,000.

Allegany and Steuben

Construction of 5.1 miles of graded embankments for future four-lane divided pavements of the Southern Tier Expressway in the Towns of Almond and Hornellsville. Work will extend from the Village of Almond northeasterly to the expressway section now being built near Arkport. An alignment northwest of and generally parallel first to Route 21 and then to Webb's Crossing Road will be followed. Related work totalling four miles will include reconstruction of portions of area roads and

grading for an interchange at Almond Village and for a scenic overlook off the eastbound lanes near Almond Dam. Bridges will be built over the Canisteo River and at three other sites. Estimated at \$13,800,000.

Contract Awarded For Southern-Tier Expressway Work

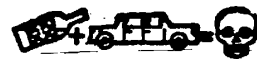
Governor Rockefeller has announced the award of a contract for \$7,348,365 to Suburban Excavators Inc., of Wakefield, Mass., for construction of graded embankments for 5.7 miles of future four-lane divided pavements of the Southern Tier Expressway in the Towns of Friendship and Amity, Allegany County.

Scheduled for completion by November 1, 1972, all work will be under the supervision of Lewis W. Hallenbeck, regional director for the State Department of Transportation at Hornell.
