Immunization Clinic To Be Held At Andover Central School October 6

An Immunization Clinic will be held at Andover Central School at 9 A. M., on October 6, 1970. Vaccines for protection against Polio, Measles, Whooping Cough, Diphtheria, Tetanus, Smallpox and German Measles (Rubella) will be given.

Rubella Vaccine is available for those children between the ages of four (4) and ten (10) years. It is recommended that parents having children who expect to enter school in 1971 bring their children for the Rubella Vaccine at this time.

As the law requires that each child receive vaccine for Measles, Smallpox, Polio, and German Measles before entering school, it is wise to start a child early on this protection program.

However, according to what we were told, things didn't happen just the way the minutes were written up. (We can't say first hand because we were not invited to the meeting, although we understand that all Village Board Meetings were supposed to be public.)

The way we understand things are that representatives of the 3-Way TV System were notified at 7:00 p. m. that a meeting would be held at 7:30 that evening. As many of them were contacted in the short time allowed and attended the discussion with the Board Members present pertaining to the 3-Way System — and then they were dismissed. After they left — the Board Meeting was then held. Right or wrong?

We also noticed that Radar was not to be purchased at the same Special Board Meeting — But — MOTORISTS — PLEASE TAKE NOTE: It is already in operation — or at least in evidence — as one motorist noticed it in operation just inside the Village limits on Route 21 last evening.

Now for the Political Scene. According to syndicated columnist Charles Bartlett, a poll taken by the Rockefeller organization shows James L. Buckley, Conservative Party candidate for United States Senator, in second place in the three-man race.

"A new poll taken for Rockefeller shows sentiment breaking 35 percent for Ottinger; 31 percent for Buckley; and 14 percent for Goodell," wrote Bartlett.

And, in a News Release dated September 28, F. Clifton White, campaign manager for U. S. Senatorial Candidate James L. Buckley, charged that Richard Ottinger has been a "do nothing" representative for six years.

"The slogan that Ottinger delivers is like something out of 'Alice in Wonderland' and simply the creation of a high-priced Madison Avenue adman," White said.

White also predicted that Ottinger and Goodell would become desperate in the weeks ahead and make ridiculous charges against Mr. Buckley.

Regarding the Ottinger record he said: "The startling fact is that to date Mr. Ottinger has introduced 361 bills and his colleagues saw fit to pass only the remarkable number of two — for a batting average of .005."

He quoted from an editorial in Friday's (September 25) Rochester Times Union endorsing Mr. Buckley as the "best choice for the Senate."

"The editorial said: 'The choice is really between Buckley on the one side and Senator Goodell and Representative Ottinger on the other'. 'The Times Union makes that choice for Buckley. And we do so at this time to help our readers in the 5 1/2 weeks remaining until November 3 understand that the same clear-cut choice is also theirs to make on election day.'"

White pointed out that Mr. Buckley's opponents "are spending all their time trying to let the voters know which one of them is more liberal."

State Speed Limit Changes October 1

Albany, September 29 — The State Department of Transportation's sign installation crews have a quick-change act to perform when the statewide speed limit rises from 50 to 55 miles-per-hour on Thursday, October 1.

The Department has set as a goal the replacement of most of the 3,300 50-mile-an-hour speed limit signs on the 14,000-mile State Highway System before the week-end. Work will begin Thursday morning and all or most of the new signs are expected to be placed by Friday night.

Preparations for the change in the speed limit, which was enacted by the 1969 State Legislature, have been in progress for more than a year, according to State Transportation Commissioner T. W. Parker.

This has involved fabrication of the new signs in the Department's sign construction shop at Hamburg, in Erie County, and some advance work along road sides. The latter has included installation of signposts where signs will be in new locations, as well as at points where the existing posts are not reusable.

Cost of the new signs and posts is estimated at \$90,000, exclusive of installation, which will be performed by Department traffic control crews. There are 63 crews covering the 57 counties of the State outside of New York City.

The preparations included alerting authorities who are responsible for erecting signs on highways under local jurisdiction. For this purpose the Department of Transportation sent out letters to county highway superintendents and all city, town and village clerks last December and again this summer.

The change in the speed limit will affect only areas where the 50-mile-an-hour limit is now applicable. Commissioner Parker pointed out.

"The 60 and 65-mile limits which are posted on our Interstate and other expressways will not change," he said. "Neither will the lower limits presently posted for school zones, city, village or town limits or other special areas."

In all areas for which there are no limits posted, the 55-mile limit will be in effect.

"However," he warned, "the motorist in all cases, regardless of posted or otherwise applicable limits, is subject to the clause in the Motor Vehicle and Traffic Law which requires a reasonable and prudent speed. This states that no person shall drive a vehicle at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions, and having regard to the actual and potential hazards then existing."

The change October 1 will be the first for the Statewide speed limit since 1946. Prior to World War II it was 40 miles an hour and during the war it dropped to 35 in cooperation with a nationwide speed restriction designed to conserve gasoline and tires.
