## A.C.S. Children To Take Part in the UNICEF "Halloween Is Here"

"Trick or Treat" is a Halloween tradition almost as old as this nation, but in recent years October 31st has taken on a new meaning in Andover, as well as in more than 13,000 other communities. Since 1950, when one small group of Pennsylvania youngsters collected \$17.00 and turned it over to the United Nations Children's Fund, "Trick or Treat for UNICEF" has grown to tremendous proportions. Last Fall, 3½ million children raised 3½ million in nickels, dimes and quarters for UNICEF.

In Andover, UNICEF Trick or Treaters will be out on Oct. 31, under the sponsorship of the C of C. Dressed in a variety of costumes, these ambassadors of international goodwill are planning to visit local homes in small supervised groups.

The UNICEF Trick or Treaters will be identified by their official collection box: a small orange and black carton with the UNICEF symbol of the mother and child. "Only those carrying this particular carton are authorized to collect for UNICEF," said Mrs. Robert Common, Chairman.

The UNICEF Trick or Treat cartons will be distributed at school. Should the Trick or Treaters not call at your home, you may send your UNICEF Halloween contribution direct to Mrs. Common.

Halloween has been officially designated National UNICEF Day by Presidential Proclamation. "The money the youngsters collect will be used by UNICEF to assist programs for the world's needy children in over 100 developing countries," said Mrs. Robert Common. "The task is enormous, and our help is needed to bring life-saving food and medicine, and an opportunity for education to millions of deprived children."

"Be on guard — we must not make books a source of failure to a child," warned Dr. William Walker, of the Alfred University Education Department to the Andover Central School PTA.

A program of Reading and Study Skills was presented by a panel of three educators Thursday evening to a large gathering of parents and teachers. Dr. Walker commented on how a child's reading ability developed stating that parent should provide a good home reading environment as well as good example, a variety of reading materials including word games as well as books and magazines. Parents should continue to read to their children even after the child has learned to read for himself.

Dr. Walker explained that testing has shown that our children can read narrative material well — but it is their comprehension skills that are poor. The difference between reading well and studying well is what needed to be developed.

Miss Joyce Harris, Remedial Reading Teacher at ACS, then demonstrated various materials used throughout the grades to develop these skills, beginning with a demonstration of Readiness materials used in the Kindergarten and First Grades to develop coordination, sounds, comprehension skills and listening skills.

She explained and demonstrated the use of various new audio-visual equipment used to build these skills and to rid the child of negative attitudes. Among the many media demonstrated, Miss Harris showed the group the "Speed-O-Strip" which demonstrated a method of aiding the child to concentrate as well as develop his habits of speed and eye development.

Miss Harris also pointed out various new reading series now used that produce enjoyable reading rather than boring repetition.

The developmental process of specific skills in the Jr. and Sr. High classes to make the students more efficient readers was the phase covered by Mrs. RoseMary Burger of the ACS English Dept.

"We must meet the needs of the students," explained Mrs. Burger as she stressed that high school students must use more exact and specific vocabularies for their studies. Mrs. Burger explained that these students needed a system for studying and then proceeded to show how such system could be learned and developed and the many ways that the school proceeded to meet these needs of the student to make them more efficient readers.

Speed reading, independent and critical reading, use of placement tests, propaganda techniques and the use of B.O.C.E.S. at Belmont for reference books used on specific topics were among the many subjects covered by Mrs. Burger. During the business meeting which preceded the program,
