Word has been received by Charles A. Wright, Supervising Principal of the Greenwood Central School and George A. Angello, business teacher at Greenwood Central School that they have been selected to become members of Phi Delta Kappa an International Fraternity for male educators.

Phi Delta Kappa has very stringent requirements including outstanding ability in research, service and leadership in education as well as an excellent graduate school record. The international group is 60 years old with 84,798 members located in 341 chapters including Germany, Puerto Rico, Turkey and the Philippines. The membership includes college presidents, Deans of Graduate Schools, school administrators, Pupil Personnel, services specialists, high school and elementary school teachers. Chapters are located in many well known colleges including Harvard, Columbia, Indiana University, U.C.L.A., U.S.C. and the University of Kentucky.

Mr. Wright and Mr. Angello will become members of Chapter 159 State University College at Geneseo. This chapter geographically encompasses the Southern Tier Central New York and a portion of Northern Pennsylvania. The current membership in this chapter is approximately 75.
