M. at the Court House in the Town of Amity, commence selling at public auction so much of each of the said several and respective lots, tracts, pieces or parcels of land as shall be sufficient to pay all State County, Highway, School, or other taxes assessed and levied thereon in the year 1969, that may then remain due on each thereof, respectively together with the interest, cost and charges which have arisen of accrued or that may arise or accrue thereon, and shall sell and continue from day to day to sell until the said sale shall be completed.
