My parents, originally of Spain also, came to Venezuela on their honeymoon. Liking the country so well, they made it their home, into which the first Venezuelan of the family was born, myself, Jose' Andre's Pascual.

I was a happy child. My parents gave me the best education possible, sending me to good schools in Caracas. I tried my hardest and my scholastic records were sufficient to deserve a scholarship to the United States, through the International Fellowship.

While in Andover, I have five subjects, all in English of course, which at times make it difficult for me. I shall try to do my best. I have already found that Andover Central School has very good teachers, friendly students and pretty girls.

Thanks to the Reid Mattison family, who are so kind to have me in their home I am learning the customs and the language of this Country. I am very happy there with my brother and sister, who help me very much. Voni's ability to speak Spanish is making it easier for me to adjust. Both of them are my treasures.

When I finish high school, my goal is to become a jet pilot and then continue my studies. I would like to graduate as a pilot in the United States. (Ever since I was seven, I liked planes. I know that it is dangerous to be a pilot and
